## 1960 Critical Year For Canadian Hog Program

While support price programs may change the picture slightly, nevertheless the U.S. market is our only major outlet for Canadian hogs at this time.

A reliable U.S. authority states the situation developing for the coming year looks quite similar to that of 1955 in about the build-up phase of the cycle.

According to this authority, U.S. prices next spring will bottom out in March at about \$2 below the fall low.

April Recovery: April, they state, will see some recovery but it will not be rapid or of great magnitude.

September: Nine State Pig Crop Report gives producer intentions for farrowings in December, January and February.

Law in December: The low price of 1958 in the U.S. will occur late probably in December.

These U.S. authorities are of the opinion that for the remainder of 1958 the profit picture is fairly bright.

In other words, in their opinion 1960 shapes up as the critical year for hogmen, and they recommend improving one's present operation rather than expand now.

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## Claim Beef Prices Will Rise Higher

Beef prices are going higher in the production of reliable U.S. farm accounts. According to these U.S. authorities, the yearly average fed cattle price in the U.S. for 1958 should run about \$2.00 higher than 1957.

In their opinion, values during the first quarter of next year should be at least as good as a year earlier.

However, they question if fed cattle prices during April, May and June of 1959 will be as high as year earlier levels, but anticipate that for the last half of 1959 markets in the U.S. should be \$1.00 to \$1.50 higher than in 1958.

Higher Prices: These predictions may explain why prices of feeder and steers with a sale in Northern Ontario and Western Canada are being reported at considerably higher prices than they have been bringing on the Toronto market.

On good authority we are informed that good well finished steers of 650 pounds average, recently sold on the Chicago market for finishing at \$12.00 per cwt. whereas in that same market prime finished cattle in the same lot were selling around the \$20.00 to \$22.00 mark.

The beef cattle situation in an ordinary business seems most comforting. We have always been under the impression that a steer feeder must secure his feeders at least two or three cents under the finished market price if he hoped to come out on the right side of the books.
