## Start Springhill Mine Disaster Campaign For Acton and District Residents Friday

### Council Approves Formation of Springhill Disaster Campaign

Organization of a Springhill disaster fund was assumed Monday when Acton Council recommended formation of such a group and appointed Mayor W. Cook as chairman.

Council also agreed to seek signature of an intercouncil at the Main Street C.N.R. crossing, reviewed bylaws closing by-laws for 50 minutes and dropped the problem in a flurry of amendments engaged an assistant assessor, the continued O.P.P. road clearing services and agreed a satisfactory agreement for further development in Lakeview.

Representatives of various organizations were present on the occasion to consider formation of a Springhill Disaster fund. The Mayor suggested some effort should be made to assist the Nova Scotia community following the recent mining disaster.

Groups represented indicated their interest and a meeting was set for Wednesday night to further plans for the local fund. Present Monday was E. Tyler representing the Chamber of Commerce, E. Smith, Y.M.C.A. Club, Mrs. B. Mowat, Duke of Devonshire, I.O.D.E., Miss J. Giles, Lakeside I.O.D.E., Miss E. Fosdell, Ladies Auxiliary, YMCA, Miss Fivier, Action Legion, Mrs. Johnson, Ladies Auxiliary Legion and R. H. Lewis, Action on Rotary.

**Relocate Miners?**

Mr. Tyler suggested the council consider asking the federal minister to work on relocation of Springhill residents since it was decided the mine would close.

Mayor Cook agreed but the matter was left with the committee for further consideration.

Mr. McCutcheon suggested the council representative should be the committee chairman and Mayor Cook was named council representative but declined to serve as automatic chairman indicating the matter could be in the own hands.

Information from the Department of Municipal Affairs led council to petition the Board of Transport Commissioners for installation of either a crossing signal or underpass on the Main St. N. C.N.R. crossing. It was explained the road was a county connecting link and while the town must petition for the protection of the county, under its agreement with the town, would bear the town share of the installation.

**55 Minute Tangle**

A summary of the town's closing by-laws submitted by solicitor A. Braida took council a 55 minute tangle of discussion that resulted in action when two amendments and motion were lost and the matter dropped.

The summary explained the only valid by-law presently covering store fronts was one requiring a Wednesday noon closing. It was noted this by-law was introduced on a petition of merchants and could only be repealed by the same method.

### Mayor W. Cook Campaign Head

Formation of a Springhill Disaster Fund Committee in Acton included at a special meeting in the Town Hall on Wednesday evening with representatives from 10 organizations present and Mayor W. H. Cook presiding.

Mayor Cook outlined the need of funds for the families affected by the mine disaster in Nova Scotia and told the representatives present that the Bank of Montreal would act as the headquarters for banking after all monies collected.

#### Chairman Named

Asking for a volunteer to act as chairman in charge of the fund and not getting any response, Mr. Cook himself volunteered for the position.

The chairman stated that at the time a donation is received, a temporary receipt would be given to the donor by the canvasser. He also stressed the importance of fitting in a form with all donors' names, addresses and amount donated to be handed to the Bank of Montreal. It was pointed out also that if any donor wanted to remain anonymous, he could do so.

#### No Door-to-Door Canvass

It was agreed that a door-to-door canvass would not be made, but representatives of the organizations would take all information back to their groups and that industry would be approached regarding a possible payroll deduction plan for employees wishing to donate.

Representatives were told that any citizen wishing to donate could contact any representative or go to the bank.

It was pointed out that all donations were deductible from income tax and that an official receipt will be sent to the donor from the national headquarters.

Each canvasser was instructed to leave a temporary receipt at the time a donation is made.

The campaign begins tomorrow (Friday) and continues for one month, ending December 5.

## \$250 Damage to Car Caused by Huge Buck

A huge buck darting out on the road in front of a car was responsible for \$250 damage to a vehicle owned and operated by D. L. Baker, 16 Brock St., Acton, on Friday, October 31.

Mr. Baker and family were returning from a shopping trip to Milton turning from a shopping trip to Milton. When they were near Streetsville around 10 p.m. a huge buck darted out on the road from a hedge and collided with the front of the Baker car, smashing the grille, radiator and hood.

Brian Baker, 17, Toronto, appeared in court in Guelph Monday. On an additional charge of stealing a car from Erasmia township he was given six months confinement.

He still has nearly 16 months to serve of a sentence imposed in Toronto on charges of car theft and twice of breaking and entering. If he had not escaped, he would have been eligible for release on April 19, 1960.

Provincial police took up the chase at Acton and Const. B. Morris spotted the escape at the Wilson home after the car had caused \$2,000 damage to the home and \$400 to the car. Baker fled but was located at his home by York Township police.

Sergeant John Carey of the reformatory staff said Baker was one of nine prisoners who made a break for freedom on October 27, running over a railway trestle bridge into a field. Seven were captured immediately and the next later in Guelph.

The charged woman has been remanded one week by the magistrate pending the outcome of the examination, authorities reported this week.

For Three Days Freedom**
