**Down to Defeat**  
 A resolution that council rescind the by-laws pertaining to effective by-laws be published prior to administration without fear or favour, was defeated.

**Hire H. Perkins**

Council approved amendment of a resolution passed earlier regarding high school construction in the district, from \$1,045,000 to \$1,145,000.

**Proposed Agreements**

A multi-paged proposed sub-committee agreement covering further development in the Lakeview subdivision by East Hamilton Contracting Co was read to council by the mayor.

The agreement, prepared in committee, had been referred to council for their discussion. It covered installation of services, loading requirements and other requirements.

Council agreed to forwarding the agreement to the contractor for his study.
