## United Church to Hold Second Stage Canvass

The development program of the United Church, begun in 1955, entered its second stage this week with the formation of a committee to supervise a "let's finish-the-job" canvass of all congregational families. The goal of the canvass has been set at \$45,000.

Alf Long, canvass general chairman, said that the funds secured will cover the cost of finishing the new church building, and also will include nominal weekly contributions to the church budget and to Missions and Maintenance.

"We will seek weekly pledges, payable over a three year period," said Mr. Long. "Just as we did in the 1955 canvass. This time, however, we are asking all church members to include in their pledges not only building fund contributions but also their normal weekly envelope giving. In that way, we will be able to meet the rising costs of operating the church, make a more fitting contribution to the United Church Missions and Maintenance program, and also build the upper structure of the new building. We also plan extensive repairs and renovations in the existing church structure."

### Sunday School Increasing

Mr. Long said that although the basement of the new church had been built and was being used by the Sunday School, more children than ever before were now on the rolls.

"We simply must have more space," he said.

High point of the canvass will be the Loyalty Dinner, to be held in the Legion Hall next week. The dinner will be free; there will be no solicitation of pledges at that time, and every church family will be individually invited by the

## Estimate Over 75 In Poppy Drive

H. O'Rourke, chairman of the Poppy Drive this year for Acton and district, reported what looks like the biggest poppy campaign to date will get underway tomorrow evening (Friday) with the canvass of homes.

Again on Saturday, another force of volunteer workers will conduct the traditional big day on the streets. An estimated 75 people are now at work involved in this year's campaign.
