Nearly 600 Served at Knox Anniversary Supper Monday

An impressive guest speaker, stirring music and the annual turkey supper marked the 113th anniversary of Knox Presbyterian church.

The four brick edifices were filled for the morning service Sunday with many former members in attendance. In the evening visitors from other churches in Acton, Eden Mills, Boston and Rockwood swelled the congregation.

Rev. Allan Farrar, Professor of Church History, Knox College, Toronto was welcomed as the guest speaker. He is well-known as a contributor to the Presbyterian Record through his work with Young People's societies and through his personal association with several members of the congregation. He graduated from Theological College the same year as Rev. A. H. McKenzie, the minister of the church.

Mr. Farrar's topic in the morning was "The Church of Our Fathers." He pointed out some of the traditional viewpoints of Christian living 123 years ago. The strict discipline exercised by the Kirk session was stressed.

The God of the Future was his topic in the evening.
