## Give \$720,000 By-Law Readings Break Ground for Acton Addition

First two readings of a by-law authorizing the borrowing of \$720,000 by debenture to defray costs of erecting and equipping additions at Acton and Georgetown high schools were approved Tuesday afternoon by Halton County council.

The by-law was forwarded to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval.

Ground for the Acton addition was broken this week, while no progress on actual construction is evident at the Georgetown school. Milton is still in the process of preparing plans on its new school, and the by-law will be presented at the county level at a later date.

**Hospital Added**

The council also made the first concrete steps toward financial aid for the Oakville-Trafalgar and Burlington hospitals Tuesday. The by-law authorizing the grant of \$600,000

per bed to the Oakville-Trafalgar outlined the possibilities of forming a county plan and board. An assessment of \$133,855.00 to the Memorial Hospital in the amount of \$140,000 was given two read-

ings, and council acknowledged the need for a hospital in Burlington and recognized the Joseph Beard Memorial Hospital Board.

The Burlington by-law will be prepared by the solicitor after consultation with the hospital board.

The grant of \$600 per bed will be split up on 200 beds, although only 150 beds plus basements will be constructed immediately.

**Micro Plastic plant in Acton has been closed as the result of what company officials termed an "illegal strike" by several employees on Monday morning.**

Officials of the local United Rubber, Cork, Linoleum and Plastic Workers AFL-CIO CLC of America claimed members were justified in their walkout following a three day suspension in Nature day of the afternoon shift working

local塑膠 plant in Acton reported yesterday that the walkout was due to two hours off the end of the work week.

The president of the local U.R.C.L.C. in Acton, M. C. T. W. Miller, stated that the walkout was the result of a pay increase of one cent an hour which was given on Monday night in the last of monthly payroll of the year.

Company officials stated that the walkout was the result of one of the workers who left the plant on Monday night without permission.

Company officials held a walkout Monday evening to protest against the pay increase.

Local union president, M. C. T. W. Miller, reported that the walkout was a result of an attempt to prevent them from entering the plant.

Company officials held a walkout on Tuesday morning in an effort to prevent members from leaving the plant which had walked out.
