

### Council to Call for Tenders To Complete Glenlea Project

The town of Acton. This information was relayed by the deputy from the consulting engineers.

Replacement of a sidewalk on the north side of Mill Street between Frederick and Wilbur Streets recently was found to have left less than a 36 foot road allowance called for and the newly laid pavement was torn out and provision made for a new sidewalk to be installed.

Present at the meeting was M. Holman, manager of J. H. Mackenzie and Son in Acton, contractor. He informed members his company had followed contract instructions to the letter and said "We feel within our rights as we did the job properly. The specifications laid out by the engineers were followed by us, but it was found later the specifications were wrong."

Mr. J. J. Hurst, chairman of the committee, said there had been some controversy by some council members that for company could not handle the job and added, "We can and did." He also told council they would never get another sidewalk down like the one just broken out. Mr. Giver told the company representative he would not hesitate for a moment to have the company do another job.

Mr. Giver said he was in favour of the meeting but objected to the administrative committee talking to the merchants in drawing up the new by-law. The deputy, after informing council he would go along with the original motion if at the meeting no closing hours were discussed.

When Mayor W. H. Cook called for a vote on the issue a second time it received unanimous approval. Council were instructed by letter that as the result of a recommendation by a contractor's jury dealing with the recent death of G. Boylan, who was killed at the Main St. C.N.R. crossing recently, to install a subway or wigwag system at the crossing, an investigation had revealed prices on the installations.

It was pointed out in the letter that a subway would cost approximately \$20,000 with the government assuming 40 per cent of the cost and the C.N.R. and town assuming the balance.

It was also noted that a wigwag system would cost from \$10,000 to \$20,000 with the Department of Transport and the C.N.R. assuming a portion of the cost and
