

Council to Call for Tenders To Complete Glenlea Project

the town of Acton. This information was relayed by the deputy referee from the consulting engineer.

Replacement of a sidewalk on the north side of Mill Street between Frederick and Wilbur Streets recently was found to have left less than a 20 foot road allowance called for and the newly laid pavement was torn out and replaced by a new sidewalk to be installed.

Present at the meeting was Mr. Holmes, manager of J. B. Mackay and Son in Acton, contractors. He informed members his company had followed complete instructions of the engineer and said "We feel within our rights as we did the job properly. The specifications had not by the engineer been followed by us, but it was found later the specifications were wrong."

Mr. Holmes said council thought apparently there had been some controversy by some council members that his company could not handle the job and added, "We can and did." He also told council they would never get another sidewalk down like the one just broken out.

Mr. Greer, representative of the company, he would not hesitate for a moment to have the company do another job.

Shop Closing
Considerable time was spent by council following submission of a motion to accept A. Braids report and recommendation regarding store closing by-laws to rescind all existing by-laws within council's power. The motion had recommended a meeting of the administration committee with P. Terry, chairman of the retail section of the Acton Chamber of Commerce and G. V. Harbin, Chamber president, with Mr. Braids present to discuss further proceedings regarding closing by-laws.

When the vote was called, deputy referee Greer and referee Wilson voted in the negative. Later in the meeting a motion was approved to open the situation for further discussion.

Councillor Hurst noted there was still some doubt as to what procedure should be followed regarding the closing by-laws and stated he would like to see all members in session with the motion.

Mr. Greer pointed out he was in favour of the motion but objected to the administration committee talking to the merchants in drawing up the new by-laws.

The deputy referee informed council he would go along with the original motion if at the meeting no closing hours were discussed.

When Mayor W. C. Cook called for a vote on the issue a second time it received unanimous approval.

Council were instructed by letter that as the result of a recommendation by a coroner's jury dealing with the recent death of G. Boylan who was killed at the Main St. CNR crossing recently, to install a subway or wagway system at the crossing, an investigation had revealed prices on the installations.

It was pointed out in the letter that a subway would cost approximately \$400,000 with the government assuming 40 per cent of the cost and the CNR and town assuming the balance.

the town paying the balance.

It was stated in a letter that the CNR was only responsible for setting one railway crossing sign at the crossing but it was pointed out that a possible temporary solution would be for the town to erect additional signs to warn northbound traffic.

Council agreed to investigate the situation further at committee level.

Malton Employment

Other business dealt with by council Monday included:

- A request from Aeronautical Lodge No. 717 for council to submit a letter to the Minister of Defence regarding the serious economic consequences that cutbacks of employment at two plants at Malton would have on the town of Acton. Council agreed to submit a letter regarding that situation.

- A letter from the Department of Highways regarding further surveys to be carried out at the Queen and Young Streets intersection in Acton.

- An application was granted to the United Suburban Gas Company to install a gasmain main from Bowes Ave. down John St. to a residents house.

- A request for the town to give consideration to a bounty for foxes killed in the municipality was ordered filed.

- Minutes of meetings of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority were to be read by council at their discretion.

- A letter from the Ontario Road Builders Association requesting consideration for services in the event of further construction in Acton was ordered filed.

- Council agreed to tender the police office, hallway, police cells and one office in the town hall.

- Council agreed to sell the old garage truck at a price of \$400.

- Council agreed to hold their next meeting on December 2, as municipal elections are on December 1.

- Mayor W. H. Cook at the conclusion of the meeting addressed council and said, "For the benefit of those who may be seeking office and those who are not, and also for those of us who may be undecided, it has been very nice working with you this year."

- The mayor wished all members who intended to run for office in the administrative committee to the meeting every success and thanked them for all they had done in the past term.
