### Financial Report

Reeve W. B. Wilson chairman of the finance committee of council gave the financial report and checked assets liabilities and expenditures.

Mr. Wilson reported it will be easy task for his committee the past year taking into consideration that council had taken over payments on \$20,000 in debentures that were held in 1957 for various projects over past years.

The reeve pointed out that two major items faced his committee with \$30,000 representing 13 mills over the 1957 budget to be accounted for, and an increase in assessments to offset this.

Counting with this, two major industries had left town causing a loss in business tax and revenue from services.

Mr. Wilson outlined how his committee was faced with a choice of a 45 mill residential rate and 70 mill industrial rate showing a deficit of \$2,000 for the year, a 45 mill residential rate and 60 mill industrial rate.

The finance chairman told his audience the latter was arrived at only after considerable debate as all committee budgets had been taken into account.

It was a heartbreaking added the reeve with the road committee receiving in in total of \$10,000 less than their budget.

Following his report, the finance chairman was met with questions from some of the audience in attendance and satisfied the enquirers with answers.

**6 Out of 110 Completed**

Deputy Reeve J. M. Greer, in giving the road committee's report noted that out of 110 requests from homeowners with problems reported, 50 had been cleared up during the year.

He outlined projects completed during the past year and reviewed problems met with and rectified regarding Knox Avenue paving and sidewalk installation on Mill Street.

Mr. Greer said he would recommend housing for town equipment and men to the 1958 committee. He stated that a place for repairs to equipment was lacking and pointed out that town workers did not have tool facilities for storage to change clothing or dry off in wet weather. "How many men have brought work in a plant without even tool facilities?" he enquired.

The chairman reviewed the Glenlea paving project and the storm sewer installation would be started as soon as approval was received, but added the paving would not be started until spring. He pointed out that the roads would be kept in good condition during the storm sewer installation.

**Sewer and Water Report**

Councillor J. Guy, chairman of the sewer and water committee, reported it would appear that in 1958 the town was down in water sales due to the loss of two major industries both water users.

The chairman noted that if pushed, the town could produce about 200 million gallons of water per year.

Councillor Guy pointed out the new well situated on Churchill Road could produce up to 300,000 gallons of water per day. He also said that water was costing 37¢ to produce and consumers were being charged 35¢.

It was decided that perhaps water rates would have to be revised with a possible increase in industrial rates and increased services charged to offset the loss.

Mr. Guy told his audience the south spring situated off No. 23 Highway has shown chemical increases the past two or three years but noted that authorities who know of the chemical changes have not advised the town to shut the source off.
