

Electors to Vote Monday Pick 10 Candidates for '58

No vote of honor or any of the kind will be given to the electors. The electors will be asked to vote on the basis of their own judgment and the merits of the candidates.

Mr. Guy told his audience that the electors should be proud of the work they had done and that they should be proud of the work they were about to do.

Mr. Guy outlined the work of the special committee appointed to handle the referendum agreement and called for the support of the electors in their work.

The mayor praised the local O.P.P. detachment and said it might be possible in the near future that more officers would be necessary to offer better and more thorough coverage of the town.

He also noted the telephone company was making a survey of the area to implement a new telephone system.

Financial Report

Reeve W. Wilson, chairman of the finance committee of council, gave the financial report and checked assets liabilities and expenditures.

Mr. Wilson reported it was no easy task for his committee the past year taking into consideration that council had taken over payments on \$24,000 in debentures that were held in 1957 for various projects over past years.

The reeve pointed out that two major items faced his committee with \$30,000 representing 13 mills over the 1957 budget to be accounted for and no increase in assessment to offset this.

Coupled with this, two major industries had left town causing a loss in business tax and revenue from services.

Mr. Wilson outlined how his committee was faced with a choice of a 60 mill residential rate and 70 mill industrial rate showing a deficit of \$2,000 for the year, a 62 mill residential rate and 66 mill industrial rate.

The finance chairman told his audience the latter was arrived at only after considerable parsing of all committee budgets had taken place. It was a heartbreak, added the reeve, with the road committee receiving a setback of \$10,000 below their budget.

Following his report the finance chairman was met with questions from some of the audience in attendance and satisfied the requesters with answers.

Out of 118 Completed

Deputy Reeve J. M. Greer, in giving the road committee's report, noted that out of 118 requests from home owners with problems reported, 95 had been cleaned up during the year.

He outlined projects completed during the past year and reviewed problems met with and rectified regarding Knox Avenue paving and sidewalk installation on Mill Street.

Mr. Greer said he would recommend leasing for town equipment and men to the 1959 committee. He stated that a place for repairs to equipment was lacking and pointed out that town workmen did not have toilet facilities, let alone a place to change clothing or dry off in wet weather.

"How many men here tonight work in a plant without even toilet facilities," he enquired.

The chairman reviewed the Glenca paving project and said the storm sewer installation would be started as soon as approval was received, but added the paving would not be started until spring.

He pointed out that the roads would be kept in good condition during the storm sewer installation.

Reeve and Water Report

Councillor J. Guy, chairman of the sewer and water committee, reported it would appear that in 1958 the town was down in water sales due to the loss of two major industries, both water users.

The chairman noted that if pushed, the town could produce about 200 million gallons of water per year.

Councillor Guy pointed out the new well situated on Church Hill Road could produce up to 300,000 gallons of water per day. He also said that water was costing 37.3c to produce and consumers were being charged 35c.
