Objects to Term Preferred Class

Ref. editorial "A Preferred Class" Free Press, Nov. 13, 1958

Dear Sir:

Does the editor seriously believe that a liquor outlet in Acton would be the cause of more accidents on our highways? Drinking will certainly increase with the establishment of such an outlet, but it will not necessarily be the cause of more accidents. Many a resident of our community enjoys his or her little nip at home and is none the worse for it. Those who drink to excess and become a menace on the highway will get their liquid irrespective of whether they can purchase it locally or have to travel a distance to obtain it, and the greater the distance, the greater the menace.

I dislike the expression "Preferred Class". It places all liquor drinkers in one class, regardless of whether a pint of liquor would put the individual a week or an hour.

I believe an outlet in Acton would be an asset to the town. It will save our residents from making a journey to Georgetown or Guelph to obtain their liquor. Most people prefer to make one journey to cater for all their shopping needs, especially in winter, and if they can do this in Acton, all the better for local business men. Our neighboring towns here would be our town's advantage as more people would be buying here.

Let us be more open minded about the drinking question. When a commodity is hard to obtain, it is human to try and get more of it, whereas if it is more easily obtained, smaller quantities are generally purchased at one time, hence the effect of excess drinking could possibly be lesser, although more people are buying it.
