Andrew Johnston Dies in Accident

A tragic car accident took the life of Andrew Johnston, 25, on Sunday, November 23. His late model car was reported to have sideswiped a hydro pole before hitting a tree and ending up in a ditch on No. 6 highway, a mile south of Kippin, near Hespeler.

Mr. Johnston was born in Athabasca, Alberta, in 1933 and moved to R. R. 1, Acton. He attended school here and later Guelph College.

He had been working for the Ontario Hydro for the past three years, having started as a forester in Rockwood.

When some residents of Main Street North were returning home from a club meeting on Wednesday evening, they noticed a car parked in the former J. J. Stewart property lane, with a man behind the wheel.

When going to work on Thursday morning, the same car, with the driver sitting behind the wheel, was parked in the same position.

Pearing for the worst, local police were called and upon further investigation, found the victim was being conducted as a result of the recent tragedy at the crossing.

Remaining are his father, Andrew Johnston, a brother, Jack with the Royal Canadian Navy and three sisters, Marlene, Carl Bauman, Toronto, Louise, Vernon Stewart, Osgoode and Viola (Mrs. Thomas Hawkes) Edgerton. His mother was the former Sarah Anne Harper.

He served for three years in the Canadian Army.

He was a member of the Kingmen club in Clinton and many of those of this group as well as fellow employees of the Hydro attended the funeral.

Rev. H. B. Stirk officiated at the service at the Rindley-Shaw funeral home, Acton, on Wednesday, November 28. Interment followed in Fairview Cemetery.
