A delegate to the United Nations, Mrs. J. Houck of Brampton was the guest speaker at a recent Y.M.C.A. meeting in the Y.M.C.A. She was the Labour candidate in her riding in the last provincial election and although not the elected member she is nevertheless an active campaigner.
