Writer Commends Editor For Local Liquor Stand

Dear Sir:

In the issue of November 13th, the leading editorial in the Acton Free Press draws attention to the action of the Town Council in which it is stated that the Council has invited the Liquor Control Board of Ontario to establish an outlet in the town without first having consulted the citizens regarding the location of a pub-house.

The Editor is to be commended for drawing this to the attention of the citizens for the restraint and dignity of the editorial and for his own consistent contact on this whole subject.

There are very valid reasons why there should not be a liquor outlet in this town. Among these might be listed—

(1) Liquor is an economic waste. If a distiller considered only the economic welfare of his subjects it would be foolish that it is a waste of resources.

(2) It is claimed that the citizens go elsewhere to shop since they wish to purchase liquor in the same area they secure their groceries. This statement may be
