64% figured they were too busy to be interested.

In the course of a year we attend a lot of public meetings. Unless there is really a controversial issue the general public couldn't care less about what councils and school boards do.

Of course the members are open for regular street corner buttonholing discussions after action has been taken. So seldom though do citizens express either opinions or interest when a public group is wrestling with a contentious problem

And then comes election time when every one has a say ... , but the silence is downright dealening

The day may come when we'll have to have professional councils and not have any choice in their appointment.

Supposing we had a professional council made up of an accountant, an engineer, a lawyer and a couple of experts on planning and assessment. They could hold meetings weekly in a number of communities and avoid the necessity of elections.

They would be tremendously effective but do you think they'd have any real concern for the individual taxpayer?

Maintenance of the local level government is important but it won't be maintained -by-the 64 per cent, who don't take the time.


