The store, all newly equipped, is approximately 1,500 square feet and houses 21½ feet of fresh meat counter space, a 12 foot triple deck dairy counter, 1,100 cubic feet of walk-in refrigeration for storage, 22 cubic foot freezer chest for storage of frozen foods and a 12 foot freezer unit as well as many other display counters.

All refrigeration is of the latest type, air + water cooled, affording temperatures at all times.

A utility room in the basement involves 600 square feet of space for extra storage and machinery.

Added to the features of the new store is a daily delivery service which started this week.


