Women Prisoners Mostly Repeaters

Of the some 20 women in Canadian prisons three-quarters are serving sentences for Grade One offences, according to Justice Minister W. Thompson.

The latest Canadian statistics show that 14 of the 20 women serving

six months or less are repeat offenders. The figure is 12 for those serving one year or more.

Women serving longer than one year are mostly repeat offenders.
