C.N.R. Flyer Derailed, Transport 135 by Bus

Micro Plastics Assets Sold Employees All Released, Will Hire After January 1

Equipment this week is being moved from the Micro Plastic plant on Wallace Avenue to their new plant on Main Street North. The machinery moving is being done by the Lattice Company of Toronto, while supplies and materials are being moved by Guy Transport and employees of the firm.

During the past week notices have been received by all employees announcing the sale of the assets of the Micro Plastic Division of Frybrook Limited to Consolidated Frybrook Industries Limited. The notice also advised employees that as Micro would cease to exist on December 31, 1958 they would no longer be employed.

It was suggested that workers apply to the new company for employment after January 1, 1959 when the new production manager of Consolidated Frybrook Industries Limited would be at the plant.

It is expected that employees will be hired by the new company as the recently moved equipment is installed and made ready for production.

Broken track bent and twisted rails interest the men of Team No. 40 after proceeding eastward on the main C.N.R. line through Acton on Saturday evening.

A broken rail in Section 11 have been the cause of a baggage car and three coaches containing 135 passengers leaving the train speed when derailed at the switch between Acton and Georgetown before the first train engine.

Engines, Motor, Member of the crew and conductor Section 11 of London crossed the track when coming south at 10 p.m. last night through Acton at a very slow speed when derailed at the switch between Acton and Georgetown before the first train engine.

Auxiliary Lighting

Four cars with lights and auxiliary lighting passenger cars were present on the switch when the accident took place. A coach was derailed on track 100 yards west of the switch and another coach was derailed about 100 yards east of the switch.

George Argue, chief engineer, was called and remained on the scene directing the larger engines to pull off the track. Two cars were found west of the switch at the direction of Mr. Argue.

Two sets of track super-crews and engineers and both power cars were on the scene directing and repairing damaged rails on either side of the track. The main line from Toronto to Stratford.

St. John Ambulance Brigade from Acton appeared on the scene and distributed hot coffee and sandwiches to the passengers and train agents preparing to eat and sleep.

Repair Train

Special repair train equipped with large crews were sent from Toronto and London to sift the debris and clear back on the line.

The repair train, which was passed into service last week by four other lines from Georgetown to transport passengers from the derailed train to a waiting train in Georgetown.

Georgian Transport was engaged as express mail and baggage were unloaded from the baggage car and taken directly to Toronto under C.N.R. police escort supervised by H. Boardman, district claims officer.

Cash Debts

While sectionmen from Acton and Georgetown were busily engaged making repairs to the tracks, T. P. Burns, superintendent of the Stratford division, J. E. Lamman, assistant superintendent, and C. G. Lodge, divisional engineer, were for much combing the debris for pieces of broken track in an attempt to determine the cause of the derailment.

Crews brought from Toronto and London with the auxiliary units worked all night as the coaches and baggage cars were put back on the rails before the line was cleared shortly after 8 a.m. Sunday morning.

Mr. Combs, conductor of the train, was in charge of the same train No. 40 which was involved in the fatal accident recently at the Main Street crossing.

County Paves Way for \$900,000 Expansion to Double Halton Manor

Christmas Day Fire Burns Garage

A flash fire of unknown origin caused considerable damage to a garage and contents at the home of J. S. Sargent, 224 MacDonald Boulevard, on Christmas Day shortly after 1 p.m.

The fire, first noticed by a neighbor, nearly gutted the double garage, damaging a new stove, washing machine and various other household goods stored there, as well as tools and building materials.

Jack Sargent, son of the owner, removed his car from the garage before firemen arrived but was unable to save any of the other contents.

When firemen arrived, booster lines were used to extinguish the blaze before it spread to nearby buildings.

Cause of the fire is unknown at present, reported Fire Chief J. Newton, but loss is estimated at well over \$800.

Fox Rabid

A report received from the Dominion Laboratories in Hull regarding a fox killed by Ralph McKeown on his farm at RR 3, Acton recently showed the animal to have been rabid.

One of the many killed in the area, the fox had attacked some geese on the farm home and was killed by Mr. McKeown with a shovel.

Dr. F. G. Oakes, when giving the report noted that there had not been any other foxes reported being caught in the area since the one on the McKeown farm.
