The last of 650 mothers has left the Acton Nursing Home and Mrs. Barry Smethurst has announced the closing of her business on Guelph St. The nursing home was opened in 1942 and since then 650 mothers have passed through its doors.

Dr. W. G. C. Kenney, who ushered little baby "Schonnap" into the world on December 26, also brought 530 other babies into the world in Mrs. Smethurst's home. And baby's mother, the former Beatrice Cripps, was also one of those babies 24 years ago.

Other doctors who have officiated through the years were Dr. Nelson, Dr. McEwen, Dr. Shortt, Dr. Callen and Dr. Joyce.

House Calls
For 23 years Mrs. Smethurst accompanied Dr. McEwen on house calls in all kinds of weather.

Often in winter, on the days before the slide roads were plowed, the doctor would have to leave his car parked on the highway. Together they would make their way through waist-high snow to a farm house just in time to deliver the little one.

Rain or snow held no fear for Mrs. Smethurst only dogs. Coming home in the wee small hours of the morning, she recalled the often-fused men, which didn't bother her. But often she would walk around a block to miss a dog!

Enjoyed Work
Recalling the past years, Mrs. Smethurst says, "I loved every minute of it. The work was hard, sure, but then to have lovely mothers and beautiful babies made up for everything. I know I will miss the babies, but it had to come to an end sometime. So I thought the end of the old year as good a time as any."
