Lifelong Resident of Acton Mrs. W. A. Landsborough Dies

Active until the last day of her life, Mrs. William Andrew Landsborough passed away very suddenly at her home, 97 Lake Ave., Acton, on New Year's Day.

Mrs. Landsborough lived in Acton her entire life, and had made a multitude of friends who mourn her loss. She was a highly esteemed member of the community and was a frequent visitor at the homes of her friends.

Octavia Leavens was born at Acton on August 16, 1878, the daughter of George Leavens and Mary Vincent. She went to school in the old stone building. For a number of years she was an employee of the Storey Glove Co.

She and William Andrew Landsborough were married in Toronto on October 17, 1900. Mr. Landsborough had come to Acton from Milton at the age of 12.

Her first home was on Young St. They moved to the old family homestead 49 years ago. This house was torn down in 1923 and a new home built in the same location.

Mr. Landsborough had a very successful butcher business for many years on the site where the Russ-Mac beauty salon is now. He retired in 1923, selling the business, and later worked as a butcher at Benton's. He passed away on January 19, 1959.

They leave two sons, Edwin George Landsborough, who moved from Acton to Alliston two years ago, and Charles William Landsborough of 97 Lake Ave.
