Mayor Charges 1959 Council To Find Contamination Cause

Correspondence has been dispatched to Mr. Snyder of the O.W.R.C. requesting immediate action by his department in this urgent and vital matter; and I assure you that every effort will be made to ensure that whatever is the cause of this contamination will be removed, as I have no intention of seeing this town's main water supply lost to anything, or to anyone without doing something about it. Everyone knows we have sufficient water at the new well, on Churchill Road, so there is no cause for alarm to the public, but to you men as members of this council, it is your duty now to ascertain the cause of this change in the condition of our water, and to rectify the problem.

There will have to be finalized in the near future the request for an Industrial Sewage Treatment Plant; the position at the present is that Canada Packers and Boardman have the proposed agreement and it will be the responsibility of the Sewer Committee to carry on any further negotiations that may be required.

The water supply for the town is more than adequate. I am very pleased to state, but the storage facilities bears strong consideration for future contingencies that may arise, and planning in this respect is needed now, this year.

The program for paving, ditching and storm sewers for the east end of town will be commenced early this year. The new street lighting program will be carried a stage further this year. Likewise the sidewalks of the Town, Signal lights.
