Y's Menettes Officers Inducted Collect Used Stamps for Fund

Ron Smith, representative of the Bishops Fund of the Y's Men's club, was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Acton Y's Menettes Wednesday evening of last week at the home of Mrs. C. Rogvaldson.

Mr. Smith explained that the Bishops fund is raised by the sale of used stamps. This worthy endeavor enables overseas delegates to attend the Y's Men's conventions held each year in different parts of the world.

Members are saving stamps and total the sum they will raise through a point system. Ordinary stamps up to 5 cents denomination with an ordinary date stamp are worth one point. Special date stamping can increase this. Points raise with the price of the stamps with a dollar stamp worth 40 points.

Canadians receive more points for Canadian stamps than for foreign stamps. Foreign stamps collected here are forwarded to the country of origin and exchanged by Y's Men there for their Canadian stamps.

The stamps are all soaked. Any with torn corners are of no value. Mrs. G. McKenzie thanked Mr. Smith for his most interesting talk.

Tips on Touring

By Carol Lane Women's Travel Authority When you drive in snow or ice, your reflexes are #11 right. But how about your car?

Even with reinforced tire chains, your car stops no faster at 25 miles an hour on glare ice than at 50 miles an hour on dry concrete.

Keeping Sharp Watch your reflexes, too. They can be dulled in a car with the windows shut tight and the heater on. This lack of ventilation can also mean a foggy windshield.

On snow and ice, or on rain-swept streets, pump the brake pedal gently to stop. If you're going down a steep hill, shift to a low gear; it'll help to keep the car from gaining an unsafe speed.

Best general advice: when you start out, get the "feel" of the road. Try your brakes while driving slowly (and away from traffic) to find out just how slippery the road is. Then adjust your speed to road and weather conditions.
