United Church Sunday School Teachers Honored at Dinner

Appreciation for the devotion and hard work of the Sunday School teachers of the United Church was expressed at a dinner last week. A delicious luncheon was served to about 25 teachers in the Sunday School room by the Friendly Circle.

Annual reports were heard, and special guests spoke briefly to the group.

With Sunday School registration 48,241 pupils about 230 attend each Sunday on an average, the teachers were told.

Secretary Mrs. Don Bothwell recalled the high points of the year in her report, including the rally month in September and the official opening of the new section of the Sunday school. All the children were indexed, visited, and specially invited. Parents were also invited to attend on rally Sundays. The play and concerts were recalled.

She reported that much new furniture had been purchased last year, with part of a request for \$300 from this year.

Small chairs and tables, a new piano and new collection plates were bought.

Treasurer Candace Orfese gave the financial report, which showed a deficit for the year due to the purchases necessitated by the new addition.

An honored guest, Miss M. Z. Bennett addressed the teachers, recalling that a year ago she and her husband had been in the hospital, but that if children were perfect, there would be nothing for the parents to do.

She recalled that when she was in Sunday school work, youngsters used to memorize such things as the Beatitudes, the Ten Commandments, the 23rd Psalm and the books of the Bible. She felt a return to such a requirement might be a good idea.

It is a great responsibility to be a teacher, but also a great opportunity, she said.
