Many Causes

"There are many causes blindness with injuries being the main cause and only when the coruea is injured can transplants be performed," remarked Mr. Stanley, The speaker explained that the C.N.IB. neither bought or sold buman eyes for transplants but stressed the whole program was strictly on a volunteer basis. Following the death of a donor, the eye is removed and shipped in a special container to the eye bank in Toronto where it is used on a a cornea transplant. "There is no religious or medical objection to people donating their eyes," reported Mr. Stanley.

20 Grafte Made

The speaker praised the Canadian Legion and Lions Clubs for their support in the eye bank campaign and reviewed the history of the campaign when he pointed out that in 1956, 35 eyes were removed and 20 cornea grafts took place.

In 1957, 125 eyes were received and 66 grafts performed, and in 1958, up to the end of November, 98 eye donations were given and 48 operations performed on the sight-

"The demand for more eye grafts is increasing each year and there are many who could benefit from an operation if corners were avarlable," noted Mr. Stanley.

3,000 Pledges

In Ontario there have been 3,000 pledges from Legionnaires during 1958 up to the end of November. which represents 60 per cent. of the donors, the veterans were in-

In closing Mr. Stanley stated to his interested audience he hoped the campaign would increase. It was his opinion that more donations would be received as everyone was interested in humanity and their fellow citizens.
