## Refer \$200,000 Public School Addition For More Study by Finance Committee

Continued from Page One and also slacken restrictions in this area in a recommendation to the planning board.

Mr. Watts asked if council could act on the recommendation of the committee of adjustment without approaching planning board. The mayor replied in the affirmative but stated it was only common courtesy to approach the board with a recommendation.

**Should Have Chance**  
Councilor H. Lowe informed members that since the planning board had dealt five years with the laying out of the zoning by-law, they should have the chance to deal with this.

Mr. Hardman explained that the by-law now called for nine foot side lot clearances and his committee had reduced it to six feet.

Council agreed to refer the recommendation to the planning board for their consideration and recommendation.

The committee of adjustment requested council's consideration of a \$1,000 operating budget to include members' salaries. It was asked that \$250 per member be given consideration.

Council agreed to have the finance committee investigate the request and bring back a recommendation to council.

**\$5,000 Recommended**  
A recommendation from the building committee to spend \$5,000 on renovations and a heating system at the town hall received the key shoulder from council following a discussion.

Councilor W. McLeod, chairman of the building committee, notified council that the upstairs section of the town hall could be closed off and renovations to the downstairs would put it in a more favorable condition.

Council questioned the jump in price from a previous estimate for a heating system of around \$2,000. Mr. McLeod pointed out that consideration of plumbing alterations added reworking, plus some changes in partitions, had been given by his committee.

J. H. Hurst noted that heating the town hall should be the first consideration.

When the motion to spend \$5,000 on the town hall was called, members of the building committee including councilors McLeod, Lowe and Peel, voted in the affirmative with the remainder voting in the negative.

**Gas Contract**  
During the report of committee chairmen, Mayor Cook reported

that at two recent administrative meetings, one combined with Public Utilities Commission discussions had been held regarding a gas contract for town vehicles and it was recommended that council advertise by letter to each gas outlet for a tender price.

Mayor Cook also noted that a recommendation had been forwarded to council to advertise for a bookkeeper. He noted there was no intent of discharging anyone in the town office but due to the amount of work being imposed on employees, it was necessary to hire a bookkeeper.

Council agreed to advertise for a male bookkeeper for the town office with councilors Watts and Rachlin opposing.

**Parking By-law**  
A by-law to regulate stop signs and street parking, received two readings. The by-law is subject to the approval of the Municipal Board in Toronto.

An amendment to the by-law made provisions for no parking on Acton Boulevard but allowed parking on one side of Mill Street east from the end of the sidewalk area on the north side to Acton Boulevard. This parking is to be allowed on the north side only.

**Deal with Items**  
Council during their four hour session also dealt with the following:

- Appointed a special building committee comprising Mayor Cook, Fire Chief Newton, Joe Whitham, chairman of the planning board, and town building inspector, Theron Jones. Their duties are to assist with any decisions regarding building.
- Authorized payment of the Glenlea paving account to date amounting to \$3,723.25.
- Appointed R. R. Parkes to the Conservation Authority as town representative.
- Authorized the clerk to obtain comprehensive insurance on all town vehicles.
- Authorized the police committee to review the existing by-law.
- Authorized the clerk to petition the Department of Highways for the town's subsidy on 1959 expenditures amounting to \$23,780.97.
- Appointed the mayor and councilors Hurst, Rachlin and McLeod to a special subdivision committee.

**Special Producers Go Back to School**  
More than 400 poultrymen from all parts of the province gathered at War Memorial Hall, Ontario Agricultural College last week for the three day Annual Poultry Industry School, sponsored by the Department of Poultry Husbandry at the college. This is the second such school to be conducted at the college. The school provides instruction and information for the specialized producers in the poultry industry, and also for those related businesses which serve the industry, such as the suppliers of feed and equipment.

Speakers included specialists in various scientific fields related to the poultry industry from the faculties of the Ontario Agricultural and Veterinary Colleges as well as two speakers from the Canada Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Dr. M. S. Mitchell and Dr. J. R. Aitken of the Poultry Production Service and Dr. Julius Frank, head of the Health of Animals Division.
