Mayor W. H. Cook, council's representative on the commission, reported a resident had fallen on the ice on Willow St. He noted a street light was out in this area.

The superintendent informed members his department was having considerable trouble with street lights being smashed.

The commission suggested a letter be sent to the school principals informing them of the situation, and asking their co-operation in notifying the students of the trouble.

Water superintendent J. Lambert received permission to have a table type cupboard installed at the third line pumping station for his use for records and reports.

He also reported the south spring and Churchill Road lanes had been plowed out recently.

One Criminal Case For Supreme Court

One criminal case was heard Monday before Mr. Justice George Walsh at the Supreme Court Assizes at the court house.

An Oshawa man was sentenced to 12 months' detente and three months' imprisonment on a charge of criminal negligence. The incident involved the death of a St. Catharines man while accused's car was travelling the wrong way on the Queen Elizabeth highway last September 16. The driver's licence was suspended for five years by Mr. Justice Walsh. He pleaded guilty to the charge.

Tenders will be opened on March 4.

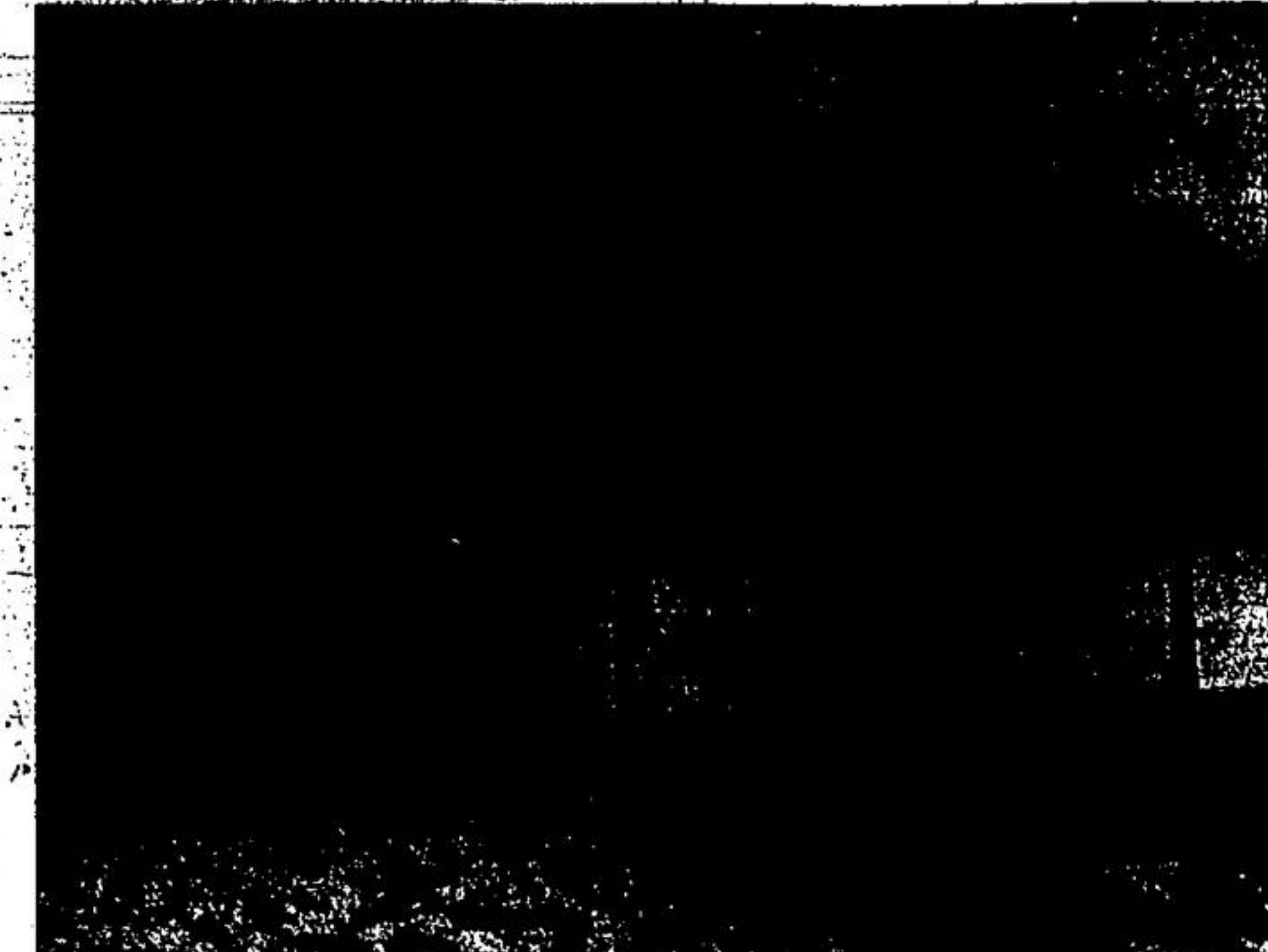
