CAUCUS CLOSES COUNCIL CHAMBER

C. Bishop Escapes Death As Car Crushed by Train

Cyril Bishop of 150 Wynford Place, Acton, narrowly escaped certain death when the late model car he was driving was demolished by a C.N.R. train at 7 a.m. last Friday morning on No. 7 Highway. He leapt from the vehicle at the railway crossing at Pleasant, approximately five miles west of Brampton seconds before the shattering impact.

Travelling alone and proceeding west from his work at Malton, Mr. Bishop was approaching the crossing when the flashing lights began to operate.

As he applied the brakes, his car went into a spin and turned completely around stalling in the middle of the tracks.

With only seconds to spare, Mr. Bishop jumped from his stalled vehicle and was able to take only a few steps when the giant engine struck the car and carried it for several hundred feet down the tracks before it was tossed to one side.

A later investigation of the wiring system at the crossing revealed that the driver only had 15 seconds from the time the signals began to flash until the car was struck, to escape from behind the wheel.

Luckily enough, had the highways been in normal condition, Mr. Bishop would have been almost to Georgetown at the time the accident happened.

Board Approves Zoning Change No Appeal on Committee Ruling

Planning Board indicated approval to a request to change a property owned by Mrs. Kate Murray on Mill Street South from the present residential zoning to C-1 which includes commercial areas, following a request by C. F. Leathland and J. Holmes on behalf of a client, when they held their regular meeting in the town hall on Tuesday evening.

Mr. Leathland pointed out his client had a prospective buyer to purchase her home providing the zoning by-law was changed to allow him to operate a plumbing and electrical business from this location.

The solicitor for the home owner explained that his client would make the application to the Ontario Municipal Board for the alteration and also suggested that if any other residents in the area wished to make application for a similar change, applications could be included at the same time.

Mr. Leathland informed the members that he would appear before the board on the situation but requested the board's viewpoint before appearing.

Discuss Amendment

A recent alteration to the town of Acton zoning by-law by the committee of adjustment which allowed a variance in side lot clearance on five lots in the Lakesview subdivision was accepted by the board following a discussion. No appeal by the planning board will be made.

J. Whitham, board chairman, stated his only objection to the variance allowed by the committee of adjustment was that in his opinion the change was of a major nature rather than a minor one. He also reported that negotiations on other lots in the area were underway and the recent amendment could have a bearing.

Mr. Whitham suggested that any variances regarding the by-law should be made by the committee of adjustment on individual merits of each application.

"If you are going to build a ranch house, you should do it on a ranch, not on a postage stamp," remarked the board chairman.

The board agreed not to appeal the committee of adjustment's decision on the variances in the subdivision.

All Town's Water Supply Now From Churchill Site

Water consumers in Acton are presently using nearly 150,000 gallons per day all supplied from the new water source on Churchill Road, according to a report from Reeve J. H. Gos, chairman of the sewer and water committee of council.

Mr. Gos pointed out this week that all other water supplies have been shut down in order to conduct further tests on the new water supply.

The chairman pointed out that the static level of the well at the new pumping station had not varied since it was first put into operation and that analytical tests had been taken but reports have not been received from the O.W.R.C. and Department of Health.

A survey of the Churchill Road water supply since it was first put into the town mains indicates the 200 g.p.m. capacity pump is supplying the town with water by pumping only 12 minutes of each hour.

Residents will be urged to conserve water by turning off the tap when brushing teeth, and by taking shorter showers.

Councillor Rachlin Calls for "Caucus" Press, Public are Barred from Session

At the request of Councillor B. Rachlin, a "caucus" excluding the press was held following a special meeting of Acton Council on Wednesday evening in the council chambers.

The "caucus" was requested by Councillor Rachlin during the enquiries by members, at which time the press and Clerk J. McGeachue were requested by the councillor to be excluded.

Mayor W. H. Cook informed Councillor Rachlin that the clerk would not be requested to leave the meeting as he was conversant with one point in question.

When the mayor called the vote for the "caucus", all members voted in the affirmative with the exception of Reeve J. H. Gos.

Press Remains

Following the adjournment of the regular business, council members arranged chairs near the stove at which time members of the press remained.

Councillor J. T. Hurst denied his overcast and bad and bid his colleagues goodnight, remarking that the press was not supposed to be excluded since it was a closed meeting. However, the councillor remained for the "caucus".

After a discussion, the mayor informed Councillor Rachlin that his press meeting and if he wanted the press excluded, then he must sign a statement to that effect.

Mr. Rachlin remarked, "I have been laboring in an atmosphere for some time which hasn't been in keeping with good government, for my welfare and other people's. I don't feel it proper to pull support deal but if it has to be that way, okay."

The mayor remarked, "You are saying in your opinion you are in disagreement with the government of the town and would like a special meeting."

Councillor Rachlin replied, "The atmosphere with me and yourself has not been good. I don't want to go into this and other things as well. I would like to discuss several matters and hope when it works out, things will be more harmonious."

Taxpayers' Dollars Involved

Wednesday evening Acton Council, by verbal resolution, held a "caucus". When the Free Press representative declined to leave, the method of excluding the reporter was discussed. Force was considered. This we feel is an atrocious commentary on the state to which municipal affairs are declining in Acton.

A "caucus" has no legal standing in any provincial statute (and they're 13 inches thick) that we could find. The press was excluded and by the same action the citizens of Acton were denied information that might have helped them swallow news of another \$18,000 they may have to include in a mill rate that will be little less than fantastic.

The "caucus" was requested by Councillor Rachlin. It followed receipt of a Municipal Board letter denying the town's signature approval on three projects when sanitary sewers and J. water mains were installed on McDonald Blvd., Main Street and the Park that totalled about \$18,000. The letter explained that the approval is denied following a visit to the Board offices from Councillor Rachlin, with the explanation the work was undertaken before the O.M.B. approval was received.

Last year the town ended with an anticipated deficit of \$32,000. Adding this another \$18,000 and Acton citizens have caused themselves the holding of secret sessions, no matter what name is given them, is usually indicative of officials who fear the actions of those who elected them should they learn of their actions.

Councillor Rachlin was the only one who, without comment, was invited to be a party to the "caucus". He indicated his opposition to the move following the meeting.

The Free Press representative withdrew from the meeting when he was assured the motion passed in council would provide a partial refund of that meeting.

Mayor Cook, however, never made any reference to the motion. He only stated that he had seen the authority for a "caucus" and that he had seen the authority for a "caucus".
