Stone, Rockwood Churches Hold Services of Ordination

The services of ordaining and admitting newly elected elders and the induction of those re-elected was conducted in both Stone and Rockwood United Churches during the Sunday morning service by the Rev. G. A. H. Moore, minister of the two churches.

In an appropriate sermon developed from the text, Exodus 18:22, "The Burden Bearer", Mr. Moore related interestingly some of the events in the life of the Christian church taking place in the world today.

The House of Bishops and the committee on Reunion of the Anglican Church will meet this week in Scarborough. It will be the first of its kind for 15 years.

"In effect," said Mr. Moore, "our General Council challenged the Anglican Church to declare whether or not it seriously intends to proceed toward union."

Pope's Invitation
Last week, he continued, Pope John the thirteenth's stirred the whole Christian world by announcing an ecumenical council to which other than Roman Catholics might be invited. In England and Scotland discussions are in progress toward a closer unity between the Church of England and the Church of Scotland.

In Africa, India and many other countries churches are coming together under a variety of union schemes. It was in Canada 34 years ago that the first concrete union between two denominations took place.

"This century is beginning to be recorded in history as the century of Christian reunion," he went on.

Shared ministries originated in the dim past, explained Mr. Moore, beginning with Moses who was advised by John to not assume all the control of his people but to share the burden with a well chosen burden bearer. Jesus' wisdom has been passed on. Where the responsibility of the church has been firmly established between ministers and people, the church has been at its best.

Outlines Dates
There is no such thing as an honorary position in the church. Fundamentally the election to the session is a covenant to service. In outlining the important dates of an elder of the church Mr. Moore said:
