Be "Realistic"

Councillor Watts replied "I agree we should provide facilities but we must be realistic. We still have to ask the taxpayers to pay for this school and ideals won't pay bills."

Mr. Lowe sparked a verbal motion for council to meet with the board to discuss all pertinent facts and was supported by F. Watts.

Board Knows Facts

Before the motion was called, deputy reeve J. M. Greer reminded council the school board was an elected body and in his opinion they knew all the pertinent facts regarding the necessity of a new addition and said he was voting against the motion.

Councillor Lowe remarked, "Council is interested in a better end product and want the most for their money."

Mr. Rachlin said "I'm sure they can find temporary room for the children for next term."

F. Watts suggested that perhaps the school board did not know all the relevant facts and possibilities regarding conditions at Malton and Mr. Cook explained everything had been discussed at the special meeting with the board.

Reeve Guy reminded council the board is an elected body who are aware of their responsibilities to the people for expenditures.

At this point F. Watts asked if he could have the assurance that the board was aware of all the pertinent facts regarding the entire situation and Reeve Guy informed him the board had digested everything discussed at the meeting.

"And they still say they need the addition?" remarked Mr. Watts and Mr. Guy answered "Yes, they still say they need it."

Willing to Withdraw

Mr. Watts informed council that this was the case then he was willing to withdraw the motion as seconder but was informed by the mayor it was up to the sponsor of the motion, councillor Lowe.

Recommend Changes to Act

On Monday, February 2, Honorable James Maloney, Q.C., Minister of Mines, presented the Report of the Select Committee on Labor Relations. Honorable Maloney was appointed Chairman of this Select Committee at the last session of the Ontario Government.

This Committee in their report is making 51 recommendations for changes or additions to the Labor Relations Act. It is not possible in the limited time at my disposal to give you any details of this report. Any organization connected with labor relations may receive a copy of the report by applying to the clerk of the House.

Loans Returned

Honorable Leslie Frost, prime minister, made a statement in the Assembly that the monies loaned by the Ontario government for the construction of the Trans Canada Pipe Line has been returned to the treasury of the province of Ontario. Therefore, the province of Ontario is clear of any connection with the construction of the Trans Canada Pipe Line.

Honorable J. J. Wintermeyer, leader of Her Majesty's Opposition, in his address in reply to the speech from the throne, made the remark that after the next provincial election that he would be pleased to change seats with Honorable Leslie M. Frost, prime minister of Ontario.

Rewe Property

Council endorsed the recommendation of planning board to rezone the property of Mrs. R. Murray on Mill street south from residential to commercial.

This action followed an explanation by C. F. Leatherland, solicitor for Mrs. Murray, who pointed out his client had received an offer to purchase the property if it could be re-zoned.

Mr. Leatherland reviewed the action and pointed out its location did not favor a residential house and explained the proposed purchaser was interested in operating a plumbing shop and sales office from the location.

Council accepted the gas and oil tank from Grant's Motors for supplying all the town vehicles following the opening of tenders submitted.

Reviews Action

During the sewer and water committee report by chairman J. H. Guy, he outlined procedure last year with regard to the committee's activities and reviewed circumstances leading to the shutting off of water from the south spring, for the benefit of new council members.

Mr. Guy informed the new members that following a report from the Ontario Water Resources Commission regarding the condition of the water at the south spring and a report from Dr. Bull of the Halton County Health Unit, the water had been turned off.

Mr. Guy noted at a hearing with Dr. Berry of the O.W.R.C. in Toronto in the early part of January of this year, it had been suggested that council investigate the possibility of an industrial sewage plant.

Mr. Calinbert of the O.W.R.C. had suggested that the condition of the water at the spring would clear up within two years after setting up at Beardmores had stopped.

Would Include Town

Reeve Guy informed council that Dr. Berry had notified him that the holding in further negotiations regarding an industrial sewage plant had been because Beardmores and Canada Packers had requested the O.W.R.C. to build the plant to exclude the municipality.

At this point the conversation

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passed.

Acton Manor

Dr. Berry had notified him that the minor sports committee for council to plow an area on the race track for parking cars on Booster Night was refused by council.

The request was forwarded to council by councillor F. Watts, representative on the parks board. Councillor W. J. McLean asked why the Minor Sports did not get their own parking area cleared as they received everything free of charge at the arena.

Councillor H. Peal informed members it took every cent Minor Sports made to provide equipment for the youngsters.

The mayor informed Mr. Watts

the town was contributing quite a bit to Minor Sports in providing ice and hiring a full time employee to make ice at the arena. He also noted that a suggestion by Councillor Rachlin to have the Minor Sports committee approach the park board to do the work for them might be a good idea.

Consider Extension
