## Awards Presented At Brownie Meeting

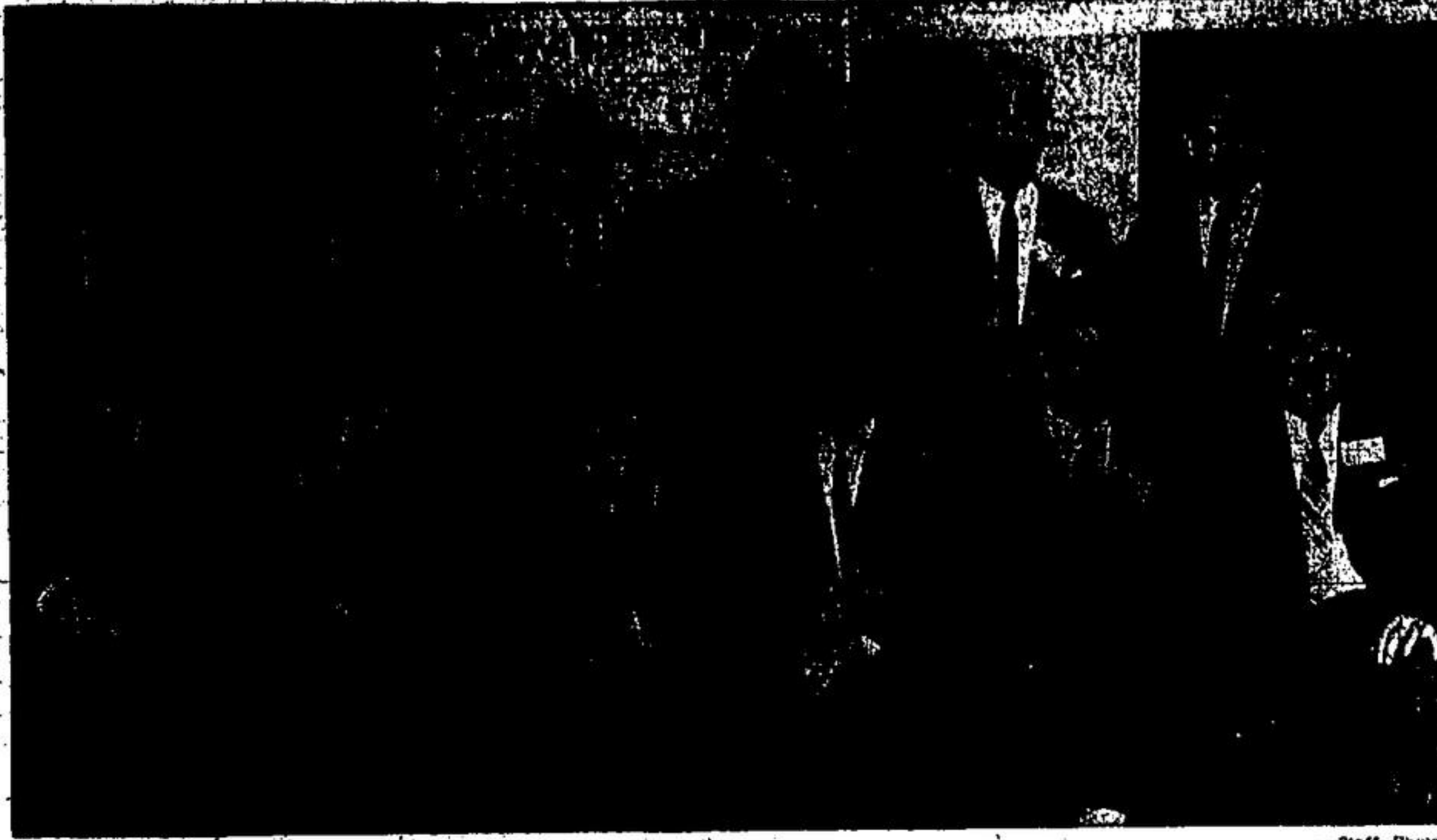

Branch 197 can proudly boast of a winning snooker team when the four sharks trotted home from the Zone "B" competitions in Brampton last Saturday with the championship.

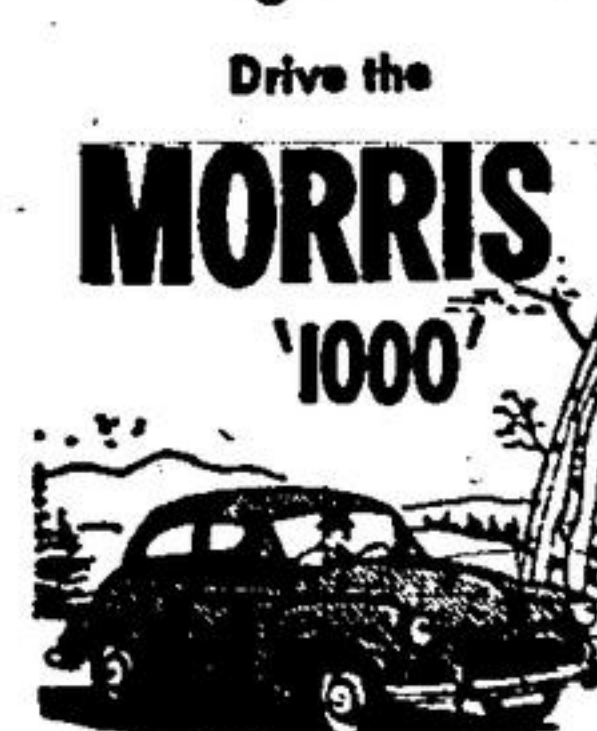

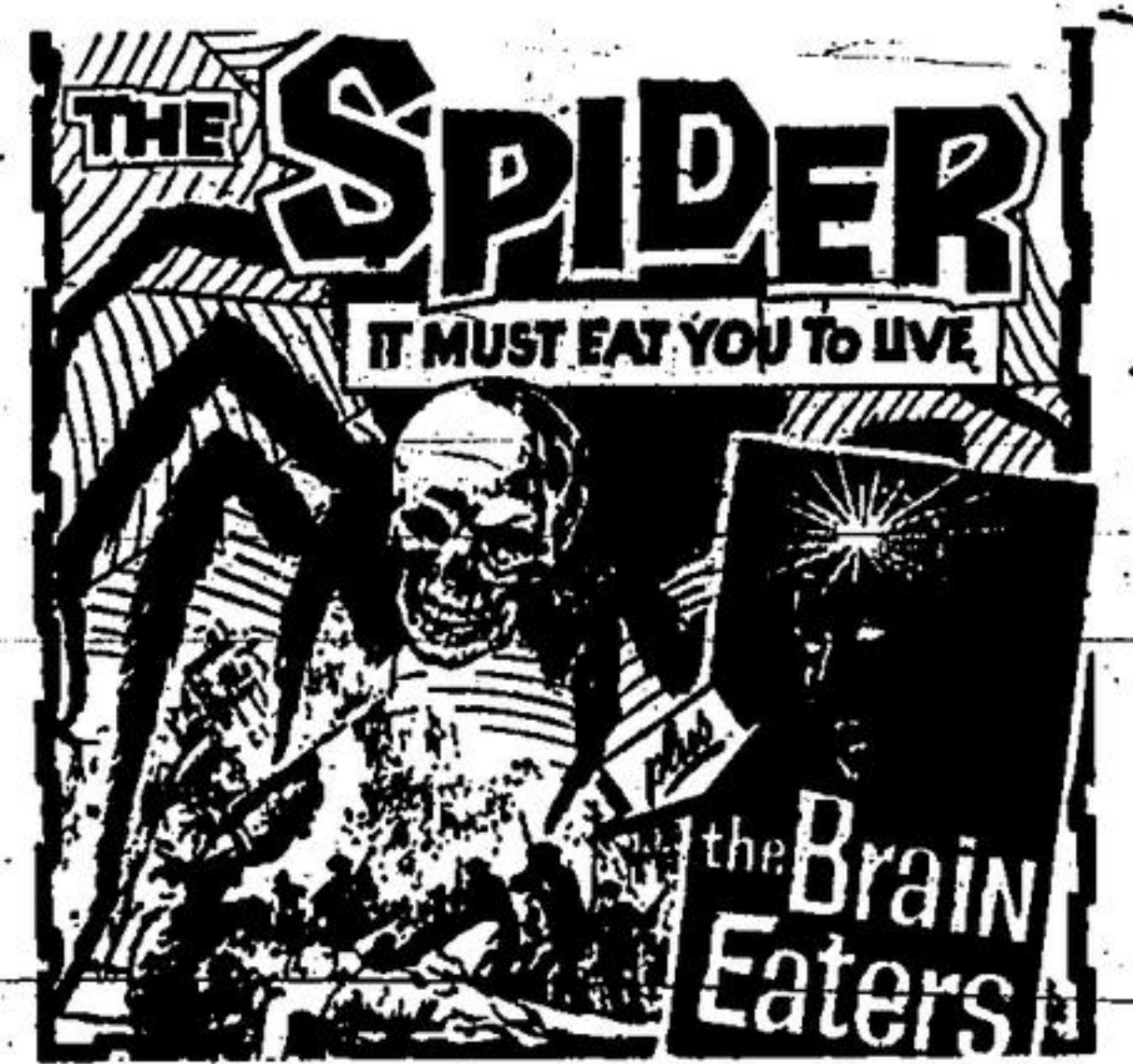
