The scholarship amount is \$90. To become eligible for the award a girl must have completed six homemaker courses in 4-H club work and her school work must be above average.

59th Anniversary Of I.O.D.E. Founding

Friday, February 13 marks the 59th anniversary of the founding of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire (I.O.D.E.). The Order was organized by Mrs. Clark Murray of Montreal in 1900. The first chapter was formed in Fredrick, New Brunswick, fifty-nine years ago.

The I.O.D.E. is a voluntary patriotic, nonsectarian organization. It has a membership from the Yukon to Newfoundland, of approximately 32,000 women in 800 chapters, and is affiliated with chapters in

Denmark and the Bahamas, with the Victoria League in England and the Daughters of the British Empire in the United States.

In peace and war the I.O.D.E. gives aid to men and women of the Services, to dependents of ex-servicemen and promotes higher citizenship among all citizens, British and foreign born.

Since the war the I.O.D.E. has raised and spent over \$200,000 a year on its work. Last year, the Order spent \$107,000 (rounded figures) of which \$57,477.00 was spent in Canada; \$120,000 was spent on relief goods and educational work outside of the country. There are two chapters in Acton.
