Tree Farmers Get Awards Lawyer Owns Halton Lots

R. H. Hungerford, a Quebec lawyer and owner of two properties in Halton County, was one of 13 persons to receive awards as owners of certified tree farms at a dinner given in Acton on February 3.

About 125 guests attended the dinner, held in the Community Hall, Acton, and given by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, Lake Huron branch. H. W. Hummel, chief of the Timber Management Division, Toronto, was chairman.

J. C. Marritt acted as chairman during the interesting presentation of the awards when the foresters in charge of the areas where the various woodlots were situated told something of the properties and what was being done on them.

Particular mention was made by Mr. Hungerford who was the possible for getting the first county by-law passed to control the cutting of privately owned woodlots in 1946.

Mr. Hungerford's woodlots are in Nussageweya, one on the sixth line, and are composed of swamp with about 20 acres of fine hardwoods.

The speaker was J. A. Brodie, chief of Timber Management Division, Lands and Forests, Toronto, whose subject was "Farm Woodlots."

He began by asking, "What is our objective 15 or 20 years hence?" He gave many startling statistics that certainly call for a greater interest by farmers and other owners of rural properties.

Would Take Market

"Tree farming was not new, he stated. Right after the war, Norway and Sweden began a program with regard to their forests. At the present time, a well organized plan is being carried out in the United States with the hope that they would, before too long, take the newspaper market away from the Canadians."

There are 80 tree farms in the Lake Huron district. "Our aim is to have the title in favor of woodlots," continued Mr. Brodie. "20 years from now, we will be called upon to produce eight to 12 million cords annually."

He remarked that all privately owned woodlots could become accredited woodlots, but they must be properly managed.

"When every tree farm shows a profit, we'll have a successful tree farm movement," he finished.
