

Georgetown Wins Four-Town Tournament As Over 200 Boys Take Part in Hockey

Approve School Addition Reduction in Mill Rate

Emmora Township school board decided at their February meeting held last week to build a one-room addition to No. 2 school, situated on No. 25 Highway near the second line, to accommodate pupils from grades 7 and 8 in overcrowded schools.

Secretary George F. Day of the board was requested to advertise for tenders to be engaged in September.

Plans of No. 2 school in the Emmora area will be transferred to the Rockwood school that is better equipped. The school is located on a high spot in the center of the town.

Mill Rate Down

The mill rate for 1959 was set at 13.5, a slight reduction from the 1958 mill rate of 14.2.

The salary schedule provides for a \$200 increment for all teachers who are re-engaged. Minimum is \$3,000, maximum for women teachers in graded school \$4,100, in ungraded school \$4,200. Allowance for experience for new teachers is \$200 up to three years.

A new floor will be installed in the kitchen of No. 8 school house. A radio was purchased for No. 5 school replacing one not worth repairing.

New Equipment

New pupils desks have been ordered in No. 6 and No. 7 schools. A fountain and sink will be placed on the second floor of Rockwood school.
