

#### Old Section "Menace"

In giving his report to council Mr. Bradley explained the burnt section of the old school was considered a real menace and reminded council that high winds could easily collapse the roof structure and force out the walls.

"Should any child receive injury or worse, we shudder at the consequences . . . Our request for the demolition of the condemned school would absolve the board of responsibility," remarked the chair-

He also reminded the council that immediate approval of the new addition was imperative to ensure accommodation for the children in the 1959-60 term.

Mr. Bradley also presented the school board's estimated operation budget for the year amounting to

#### Querles Reduction

Following the presentation of the budget councillor B. D. Rachlin enquired how the school tward could reduce their estimates by 20 per

The board chairman informed him that in the first place there was surplus because there had been a supplemental grant forthcoming from the department. He also explained that the school board had intended to install a heating system in the stone school at a cost of \$53,060 but this now could be included in the new addition and be eligible for a grant

It was also explained that last year's requisition had been high because it was necessary to bring the salary schedule up to a competitive basis with other towns.

Councillor J. T. Hurst guipped "Possibly we can look forward to another surplus this year," and was promptly answered by the chairman as he remarked, "If there is it will be by the good management of the school board".
