Reports indicate that there is a possibility that 125 more homes may be built in this same area.

### Need of Hardtopped Roads At Erin Stressed by M.P.P.

Urgent need of hardtopped roads in the Erin district was stressed in the Legislature by the Hon. John Root, M.P.P. for Wellington-Dufferin. He mentioned great quantities of sand and gravel being trucked from this area without suitable roads and held that these deposits are a great asset to the future development of the province.

The local member spoke during discussion of estimates for the department of mines. He stressed the need for north-south roads to serve the Erin area.

"I want to refer to a great deposit of sand and gravel that is being processed in part of my riding and in the north end of the county of Peel, between highway 10 and Caledon and highway 24 at Ospringe and north of Acton," the minister said.

"There are nine firms processing a huge deposit of sand and gravel in the area. On the basis of tests there are some 67 million tons of high quality material.

**Great Development**

"This deposit is situated north of one of the greatest developments in Ontario, in Canada and perhaps in North America. That development is taking place between Toronto and Hamilton along the north shore of Lake Ontario, and it is gradually extending north into the area where this gravel deposit is situated. It is some 25-35 miles north of Lake Ontario.

"I would suggest to the House that these deposits are a great asset to the future development of the area I have mentioned.

"I suggest that it is in the best interests of the province to build necessary roads if this high standard material is to be moved into the area of development at a reasonable cost. There are no north-south highways in the area between highway 10 and 6 to the north of highway 7 and it is a distance of nearly 30 miles. This is the area in which the gravel deposits are situated.

"Highway 10 north of Caledon is carrying a terrific volume of heavy transports concentrated on this highway due to the lack of other high standard north-south roads.

"Many of these heavy transports are using county roads in an effort to reduce the number of miles and lower the cost of the material when it is delivered farther south.

**Not Fair**

"I want to suggest that it is not fair that the county taxpayers should be forced to build the high standard roads that are needed, if the huge deposits of necessary building material are to be delivered at a reasonable price.

"We know that the trucking rate is based on the one-a-mile principle. We need high standard roads in the area if we are to deliver the building material that is available at a reasonable price. I might suggest that if the Liberal government which was in power in 1943 when they were extending our highway system by some 2,000 miles had continued highway 25 north into the area, the problem would have been solved by that party.

"If we force heavy transport to go east to highway 10 or west to highway 6 we add extra miles and are going to increase the cost of the material that will be delivered farther south.
