OBITUARY

Eramosa Township Resident Mrs. Leybourne Interred

A resident of Eramosa township for most of her life, Mrs. Jack Leybourne passed away on March 3 in the Guelph General Hospital. Born on the fourth line of Eramosa township, she was the daughter of John Sockett and Lucy Sunley, both pioneer families in the township.

Mrs. Leybourne's paternal grandfather was Captain George Sockett, who came from England about 1832. He served in the Queen's Own Regiment in England and also during the rebellion in Upper Canada. He used his influence to get the release of some of his neighbors who had become imprisoned in Hamilton for taking sides with the rebel leader, W. L. Mackenzie.

She was also related to Miss Mary Leslie, who was a great aunt, half sister to Ruth Griffin, wife of Captain Sockett. Miss Leslie wrote the first novel to be published in what was then Canada West. The Leslie home still stands on No. 24 highway.

Attended Rockwood School.
Mrs. Leybourne, who was Lucy

Jane Sockett before her marriage, attended Rockwood school as a girl and was a member of St. John the Evangelist Anglican church, Rockwood. Her family were always staunch members of the Anglican church and her great grandfather was the Rev. Thomas Sockett of Petworth, England, who was an active correspondent of Bishop Strachan in the early days of settlement in Upper Canada.

Mrs. Leybourne was fond of family and local history and kept many records and family treasures. She recalled in some carefully written notes, that in 1900 there were 20 members of her family bearing the name Sockett on Eramosa's fourth line. She was the last to leave in 1952.

Funeral Service
Funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Ven. Archdeacon S. A. Kirk of St. George's church, Guelph, at the McLanagan-Wall funeral home, Guelph, on Friday. Pallbearers were George Benham, Ernest Benham, Lawrence Mitchell, Bill Tilton, Fred Scott and Charles Hopkins. Interment was in Woodlawn cemetery, Guelph.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Leybourne is survived by one sister, Mrs. Liza Wishart, Guelph. She was predeceased by four brothers, George, Stanley, Bert and Henry, also two sisters, Ruth and Hannah.
