## Move Amendments to Budget

Mr. J. J. Wintermeyer, leader of Her Majesty's Opposition in the Assembly, in his address in reply to the budget presented by the Provincial Treasurer, moved an amendment to the budget.

1. That the budget should not be presented in two parts, one for ordinary and one for capital expenditure.

2. No provision for winter employment.

3. No plan for debt retirement.

4. No Dominion-Provincial Conference called.

5. No plan for re-allocation of revenues.

6. Does not provide enough for scholarships and development of the north.

7. Does not provide enough for agriculture.

8. Does not make provision for the extension of services in the field of Hospital and Health Insurance.

Hon. James Maloney, Minister of Mines, said in answer to the address of the Leader of the Opposition, Mr. J. J. Wintermeyer, that in his opinion Hon. Wintermeyer could make a much better job of his position as Leader of Her Majesty's Opposition if he had more support from the members of his party.

### Sympathy Extended

At the opening of the Assembly on Monday, March 2, the Honorable A. Kelsa Roberts, Q.C., Attorney General, spoke of the disaster that happened at Listowel when the Director of Athletics for the town and seven boys lost their lives. He extended the sympathy of the Assembly to the bereaved.

Hon. John Yaremko, chairman of the Select Committee on Labor Relations, presented the report of the committee. It contains many recommendations which we all hope will make for better public relations between employer and employee. Hon. Charles Daley, Minister of Labor, indicated he has reservations about some of the recommendations offered by the Select Committee on Labor Relations.

Premier Leslie M. Frost said that the Ontario government is pressing the Federal government at Ottawa for extension of the federal-provincial winter employment program.

### Charters Increase

Hon. Dr. Phillips, provincial secretary and registrar general, in giving the report of his department, made the statement that in the years 1943-44 there were 630 charters issued for the formation of new companies. In 1951-52 there were 5,000 charters issued an increase of almost 10 per cent.

Hon. Leslie M. Frost, Prime Minister of Ontario, made the statement that in his opinion the relationship between the members of the legislature and the executive body of the government of Ontario was a smoother working arrangement than in most governments.

Hon. Louis P. Cecile, Minister of Public Welfare, said in his address that it was his opinion that parents must be more responsible for the placing of their children in homes that are not registered, and not conducive to the welfare of the children.

### Anniversary Scroll

On Thursday, March 4, Hon. Dr. Phillips, provincial secretary, presented on behalf of the members of the assembly to the Speaker of the House, Hon. the Reverend A. W. Downer, a scroll on the occasion of Mr. and Mrs. Downer's wedding anniversary.

Mr. Donald C. MacDonald, leader of the C.C.F. group in the Assembly, said in his address that the Smallwood government in Newfoundland is using the trade union movement in Newfoundland the same way as the Hepburn government did in Ontario.

Premier Frost turned down a challenge by Arthur J. Reanne, Liberal Essex North, to call a provincial election on the unemployment issue.

## New Dog Licensing By-law Fire Agreement Approved

The regular March meeting of the Kram-sa township council was held in Rockwood town hall with all members of council present. Reeve Joseph L. Baker presided.

Clifford Duffield was reappointed inspector under the Warble Fly Control Act, his remuneration to be \$1.00 an hour plus 16¢ per mile travelled. Mr. Duffield was authorized to purchase the necessary warble fly powder from King Calcium Co., Campbellville, at 30 cents per half pound bag and 51 cents per one pound bag.

## G'town, Milton Jobless Unite

Like Acton, both Milton and Georgetown have organized employment services since the Layoffs at Mill.

In Georgetown, 413 people registered. Some 65 different trades are represented including clay masons, bakers and bookkeepers. There are 16 professional engineers among those listed.

To date, jobs made known to the employment service have not been numerous. Several have been placed in positions.

The service is attempting to place applicants in the Georgetown area so they will not be forced to leave their homes.

### "Favorable Progress"

Milton's employment service claims to have met with "favorable progress" in their efforts to "find work for 256 unemployed there. They also hope to "locate" a new industry for the county town.

This week, 45 per cent of the Milton men registered had found employment. Nearly 90 job openings have been submitted to the committee.

Lists of vacancies are posted in the town hall there and an information centre has been set up.

A grant of \$50 was made to the (Georgetown) branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society.

The road expenditure by-law for 1950 was passed, subject to the approval of the Department of Highways.

### New Dog By-law

The dog licensing by-law of 1950 was repealed and a penalty of \$2 imposed on owners and harborers of dogs for each license not purchased within 10 days of the date the assessment is delivered, in a new by-law which was given the necessary readings and passed.

A by-law to prohibit the use of any cabin trailer in the township of Kram-sa was passed.

One letter was received in response to the advertisement in the Daily Commercial News for supplying, delivering and erasing approximately 8,000 cubic yards of gravel. Tender of the Holburn Construction Co. at 77¢ per cubic yard was accepted, subject to the approval of the Department of Highways.

### Renew Fire Agreement

The fire protection agreement with the trustees of Rockwood village will be renewed as follows: \$100 per hour for the first hour and \$50 for each additional hour to reach five attended in the township. The minimum yearly payment is to be \$1,200.

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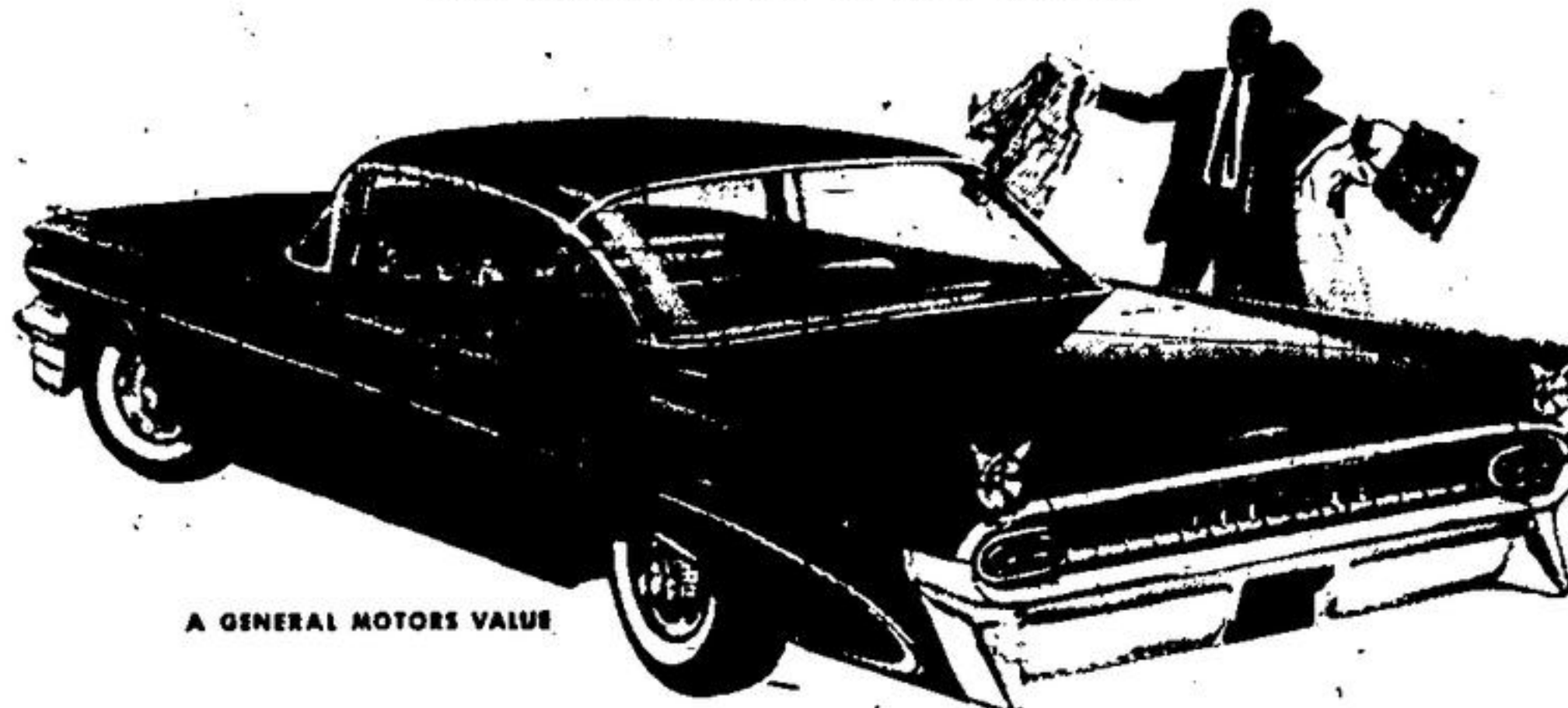
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
