Extend Season to August 1 First Reports in on Contest

Open season on **Halton foxes** until August 1 was temporarily declared by county council Tuesday afternoon. A by-law will be passed at next month's meeting allowing the shooting of foxes and payment of bounties until that date.

The extension from the regular February 28 closing date was first urged by the Ford Rod and Gun Club, Oakville, in a letter to council. The club suggested adding the word "fox" onto the groundhog and starting licence.

"Halt Rabies"
"The only way to halt rabies is to destroy the foxes," urged deputy reeve Archie Service of Nassagaueya. Council approved the extension unanimously, after the clerk reported neighboring Wentworth county was also allowing the August 1 deadline.

A suggestion to have the county become the licensing agent for Halton hunters and anglers was turned down after considerable discussion. It was felt the extra duties would be too much for the county staff. Township outlets will be continued.
