## Easter Message to be Repeated Sunday Sunrise Services, Cantatas Planned

Easter Sunday morning time of most vital importance of all the Christian year, will find the joyous message of Christ's resurrection echoed in every church in Acton. Music, prayer, scripture reading and addresses will all recall the glory of the first Easter as they are reasserted in settings of white lilies and spring flowers.

The services will be preceded by others, leading up to the singing of the familiar "Hallelujahs". Good Friday services and sunrise services are planned.

The series of most well received addresses by Dr. Cromley Hunter, sponsored by the Ministerial Association, concludes tonight. Acton United church has been filled with worshippers each evening this week.

**Palms Blessed**  
On Palm Sunday at the Church of St. Alban the Martyr, the celebration of the Holy Eucharist at 8:30 and 11 a.m. was preceded by the blessing of palms. Large congregations attended the first services of Holy Week.

On Monday, the celebration of Holy Eucharist at 10 a.m. was followed by Evensong at 8 p.m. and similar services were held Tuesday. On Wednesday the celebration of Holy Eucharist was at 7 a.m. with Evensong at 8 p.m.

Today is Maundy Thursday, and at 8 p.m. will be celebration of the Holy Eucharist to coincide with the institution of the Blessed Sacrament.

**Altar Stripped**

There will be a service of baptism Sunday afternoon.
