During the enquiries by members, Reeve J. Guy reported a complaint from an Acton resident regarding the Oakville Humane Society and the dog control program.

Mr. Guy reported the citizen had informed him that his dog had been picked up by the dog catcher. When the owner had called the town office to enquire about the animal, he had requested to speak to the dog catcher. The Humane Society employee had refused to speak on the phone and had taken the dog to Oakville.

Prepared to Pay

The resident informed Mr. Guy he was prepared to make whatever payment was necessary to obtain his dog and when he was unable to procure his pet from the truck, he had to take time off work and drive to Oakville to secure the release of the animal.

Clerk J. McGeachue expressed the opinion it was not the fault of the Humane Society but rather of the council in not having a dog by-law. He also notified the members the dog catcher was acting on instructions from his superiors.

Council decided to investigate the drafting of a by-law to take care of similar situations in the future.
