Peel's Council Holds Tax Line
 BRAMPTON: Softening the impact of a one-half mill increase in the county's road tax, Peel council struck a rate of four mills for general purposes, a decrease of one-half mill over last year's general rate.
 Total county rate this year is nine mills, identical with the 1958 level.
 The roads levy of five mills, designed to provide funds for a continuance of the permanent road construction program, was approved by council at the February session.

Township Pays Most
 The 1958 municipal levy is paid in full from general municipalities' own assessment bases. Toronto levied 27 mills, the highest assessed rate, pays 63.119 per cent of the total county levy. Brampton's contribution is 23.626 per cent and Oakville's is 5.882 per cent. Other percentages are as follows: Bolton 9.06, Cochrane East 147, Park Street 7.557, Streetsville 7.221, Acton 7.139, Caledon 7.681, Toronto 6.940.

Between 1956 and 1958, on a per capita basis, the assessed value of gross national production in Canada declined in value from \$1,662 to \$1,520.



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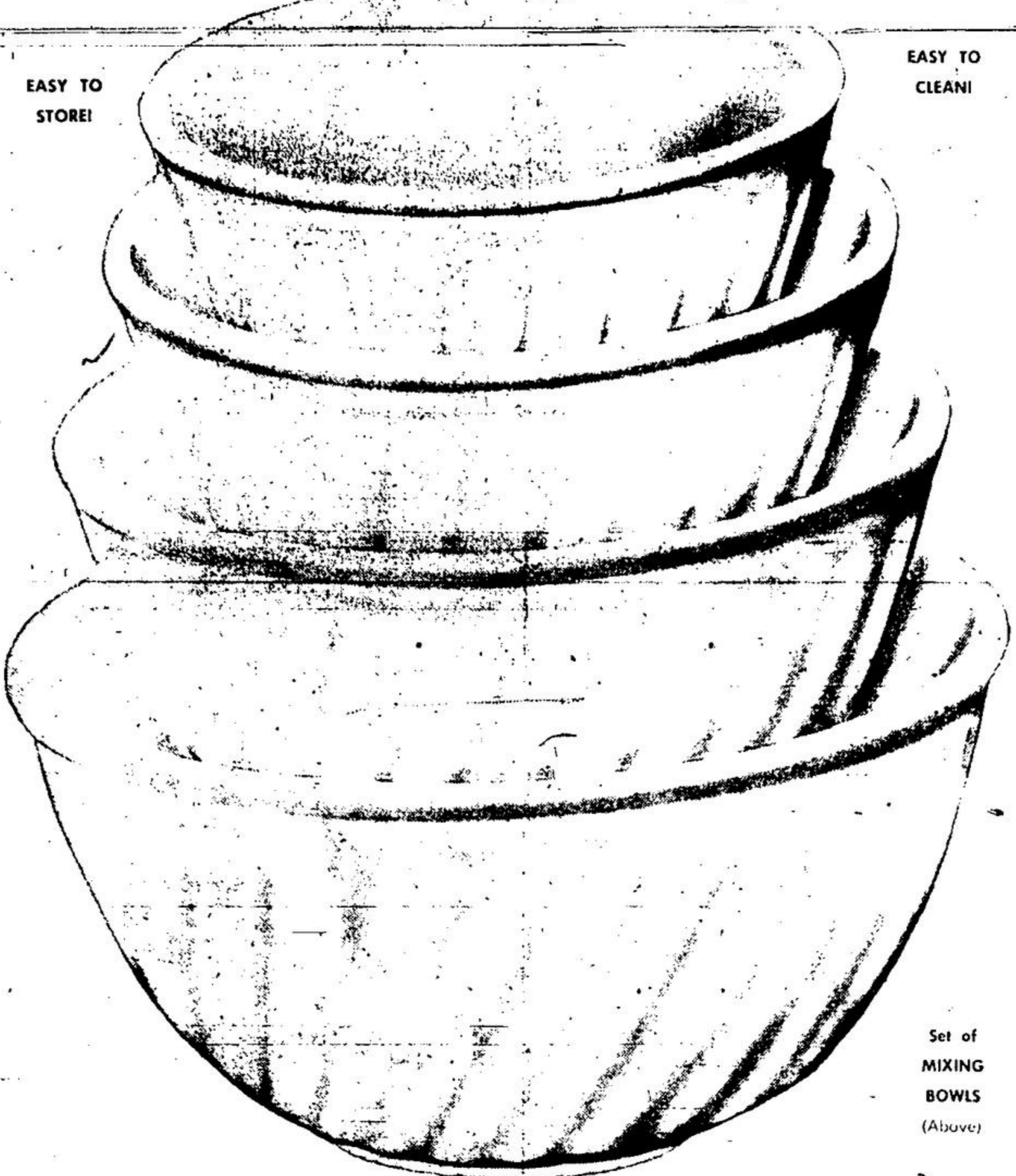
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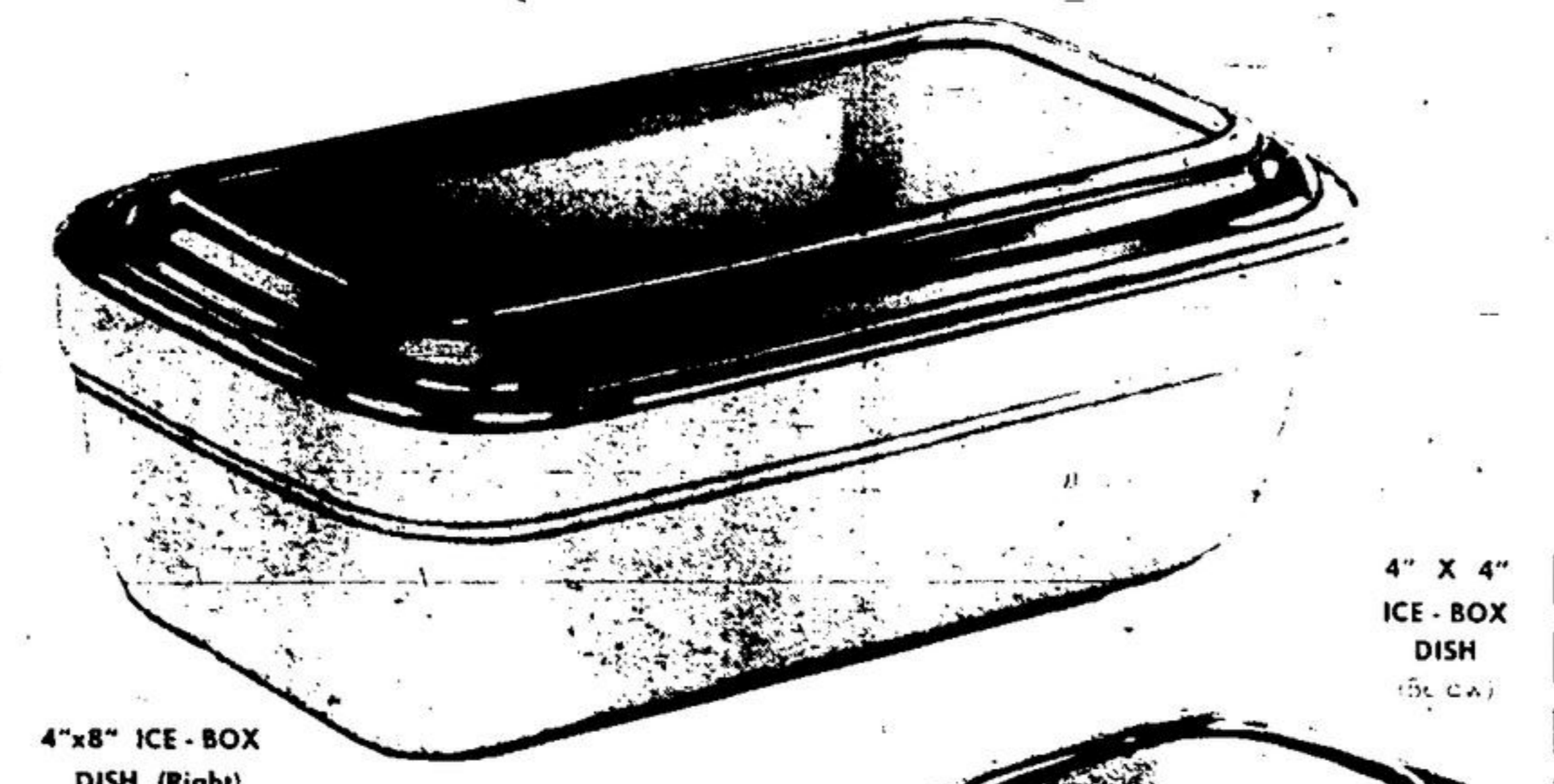
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
