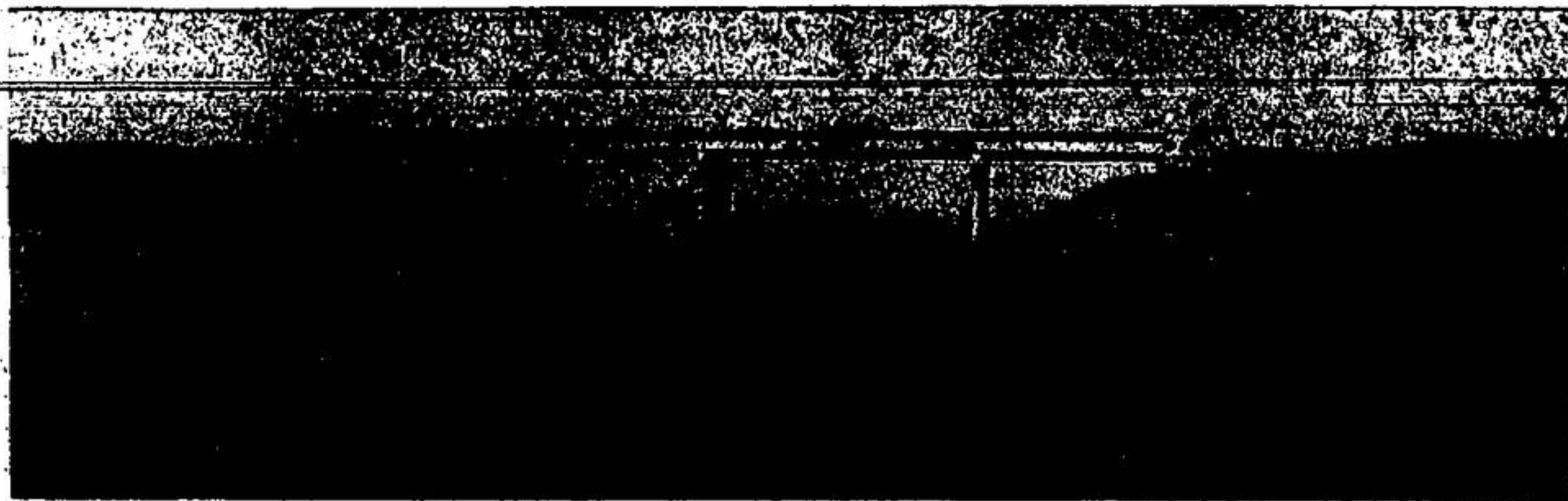

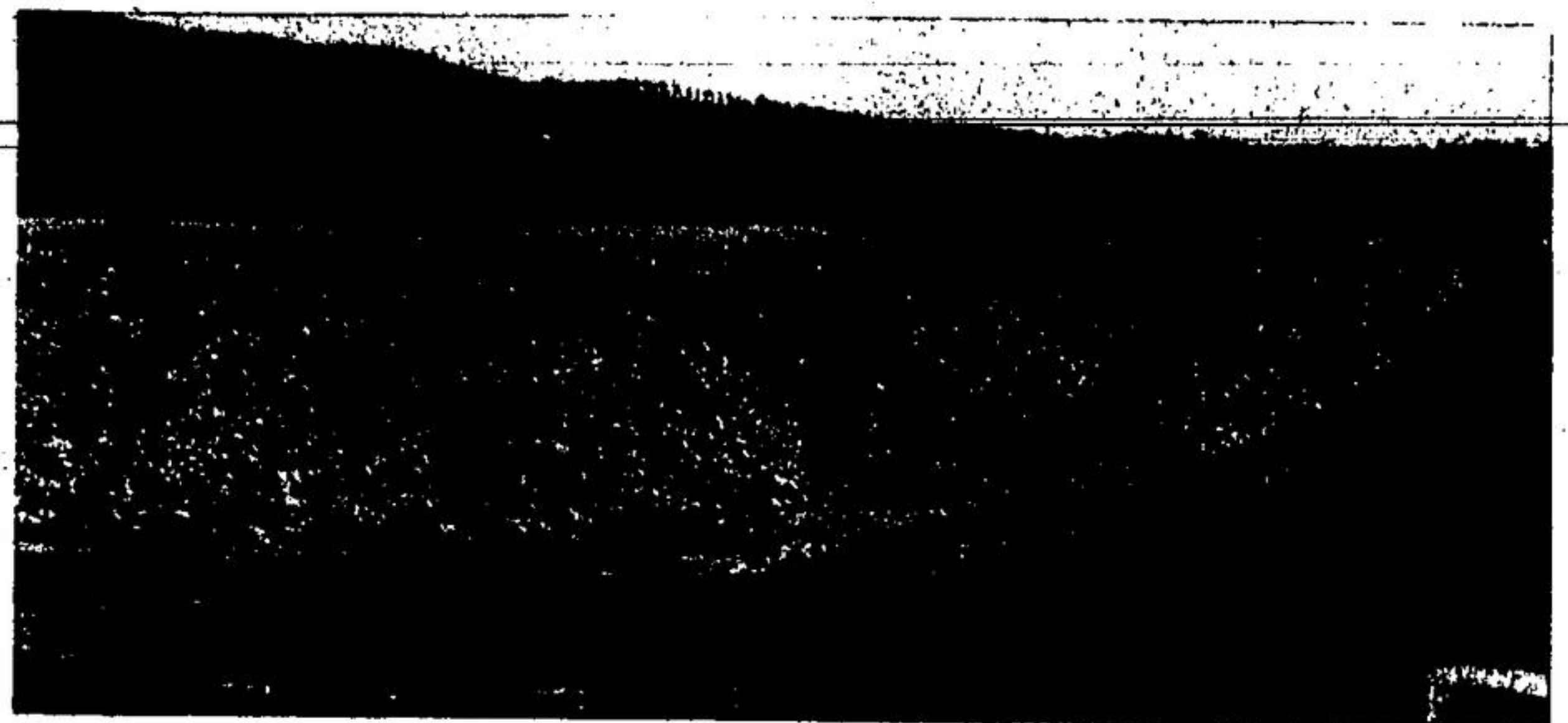
Stretching west Highway 401 is shown crossing Nassagaweya Town Line.



Through Halton's scenic settings Highway 401 stretches west.



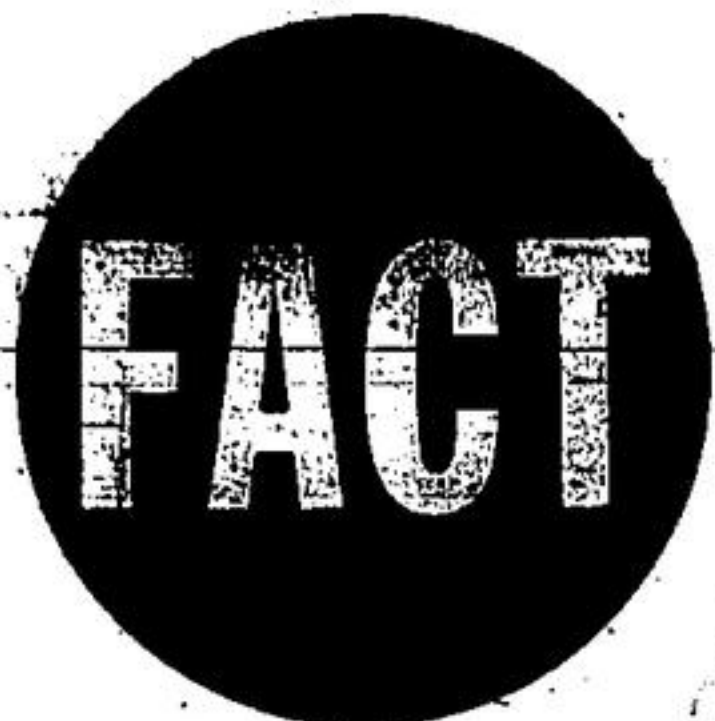
Modern structures will provide crossovers. This one will cross Base Line east of Milton.

WHAT ARE THE CAUSES OF FIRES? The figures shown below indicate the estimated American fire losses by causes, as prepared by the National Fire Protection Association.

(A) Oil-Fired equipment (see also flammable liquid appliances)	53,000
(B) Gas-Fired equipment (see also gas and appliances)	12,100
