### Grand Union Records Its Highest Earnings

Record net earnings of \$6,446,522 for the Grand Union Co. during the 52-week fiscal year ended February 28, 1959, have been reported by Lansing P. Shield, president of the eastern food chain. This was a gain of \$633,157 over net income of \$5,813,365 for the previous fiscal year.

Earnings after taxes were equal to \$2.53 per share of common stock during fiscal 1959, based on the average number of shares outstanding during the year. This compares

with earnings of \$2.46 a common share in fiscal 1957, based on the average number of shares outstanding during that year, adjusted for a five per cent common stock dividend paid May 29, 1958.

**First Time**  
Sales of Grand Union in the year just ended exceeded \$500,000,000 for the first time in the company's history. The sales totalled \$503,712,807, an increase of 17.7 per cent above the previous record of \$427,871,062 during the 52-week 1957 fiscal year.

Forty-nine new stores were opened during 1958, a new record in construction by the company. Another 14 markets were enlarged and renovated. 77 stores were acquired. At the end of the year, Grand Union was operating 472 markets, as compared to 381 at the close of 1957.

### Complete Renovations Add Modern Store Front

Completely modernized, Acton's Home Furnishings Store in the Mill Street business section, now sports an all new stainless steel front and plate glass window as well as a side show window and many other alterations.

Starting last week, workmen under contractor C. D. Dine of Guelph began tearing out the old store front and chipping holes in the side wall to make ready for steel supporting beams for renovations, to allow for more modern display space for merchandise.

**Drop Ceiling**  
Included in the renovations are the installation of a new drop ceiling, lowered 18 inches from the previous one, complete with unglazed tile and new fluorescent type lighting.

A long narrow side window will allow customers a better view of the interior from the side street and a sloping ramp to the front entrance makes it easier for customers to gain entry to the renovated building.
