**Price Goes Up Costs Go Down With D.H.I.A.**

Good management meant nearly \$1,700 more for some Halton (East) County farmers' pockets.

From a net gain of \$352 per herd in 1954 to a net gain of \$2,040 per herd in 1958, sums up results for Halton (East) County dairy farmers who affiliated with the D.H.I.A. (Dairy Herd Improvement Association) and practised its recommendations during that period. Reflected in terms of returns, per hour of labor, these figures mean an increase from \$1.05 to \$1.82.

Between 1954 and 1958, production per cow rose from 8,386 lbs. to 9,978 lbs. A change in pounds of concentrate fed per cow equivalent from 1,509 to 1,580 resulted in an increase in the pounds of milk per pound of concentrate fed from 5.6 to 5.8. Man hours per cow dropped from 99 in 1954 to 83 in 1958, meaning that the man hours per 100 lbs. of milk decreased from 12 to 1.0.

For every \$100 investment, these farmers were selling 11 cwt. of milk in 1954 and sold 13 cwt. in 1958. At the same time, Halton (East) County farmers increased the average cows in their herds from 19 to 23. The average price received per hundredweight rose from \$4.14 to \$4.33 during this period, while the cost per 100 lbs. of milk declined from \$3.89 to \$3.30.
