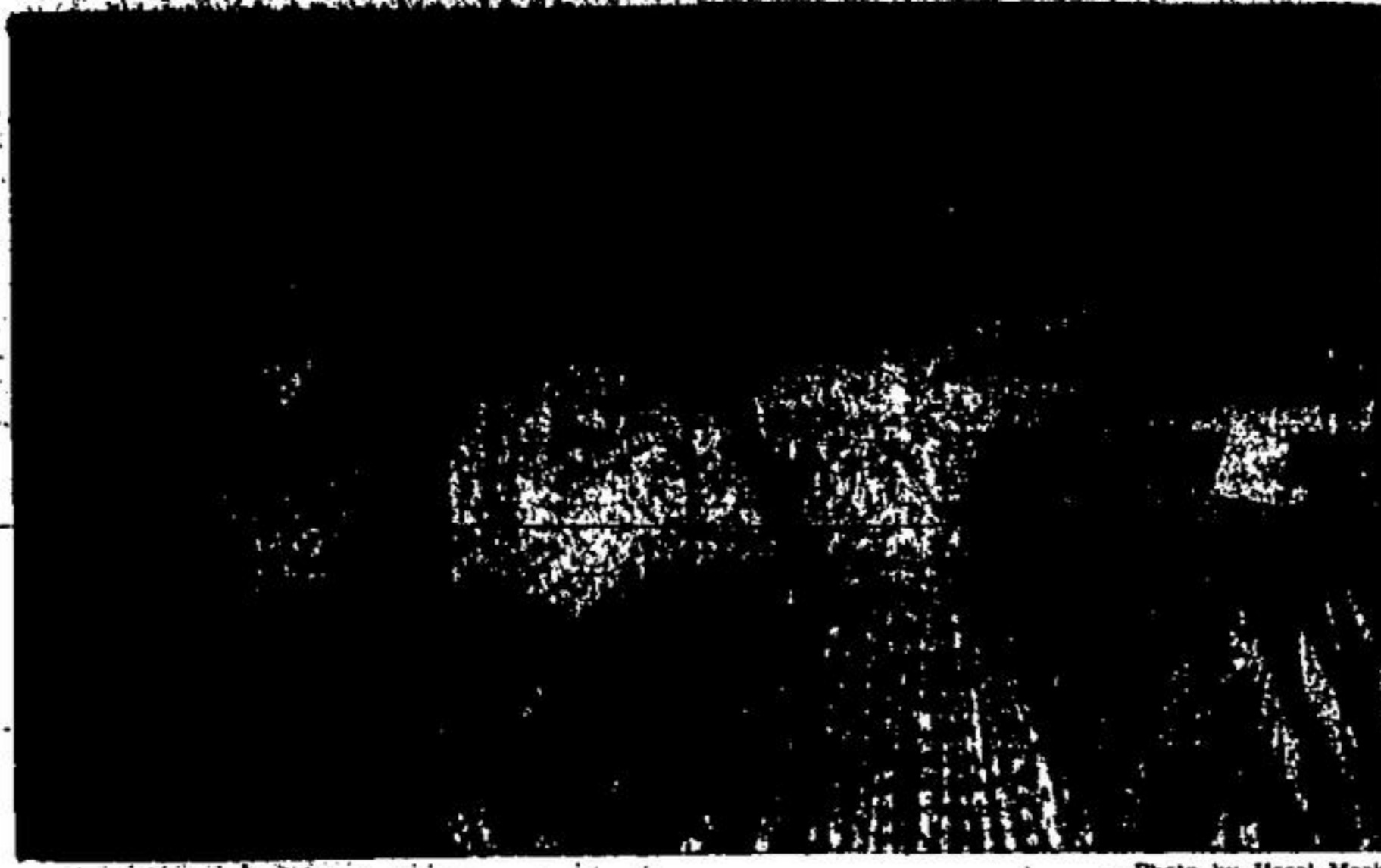
Mrs. Patcai closed the meeting with prayer. A delicious salad lunch was served.

## \$2,000,000 Deaf School "In the Near Future"

The proposed new Milton residence school for deaf children will be constructed "in the near future" according to Stanley Hall, M.P.P., who relayed education minister Dr. W. J. Dunlop's announcement Friday to the Free Press.

"Dr. Dunlop made the announcement," he said. "Planning is now in progress so that the construction may start in the near future. The school will be of the most modern design with staff residence and hospital, and will be equipped with living quarters for 250 pupils," he added.

Cost of the project, he said, would be "over \$2,000,000." It is understood the initial building is only a stage of the school, which eventually will equal the size of the 445-pupil school at Belleville.

It will be located on Highway 25 directly south of Halton Centennial Manor, on the former Kingdon farm at the boundary of the town.
