**County Prepares By-Law To Dissolve H.S. District**

The provision of facilities for town-ship pupils would be natural. "We feel we have the members on the board and they're doing a capable job as a district but we feel by division they might have more time."

Georgetown trustee E. Forgrave noted that despite five representatives on the board it was only one-third of the total board and "we have met strong opposition on many occasions in getting the things wanted for Georgetown."

**"Progressive Thinking"**  
He reviewed an earlier rejection of installing shop facilities in Georgetown with home economics in Acton on a recorded vote of the board and the subsequent approval of the installation at Georgetown. This does not give an indication of the progressive thinking of the board.

He argued a double gym should have been built at Georgetown rather than the single gym planned for the new addition explaining the difference in cost and the fact that Georgetown would soon require it.

Milton trustee John Hall recalled that in 1956 Milton was the only municipality favoring dissolution and he was "sure Milton has not changed its stand in that regard."

He reviewed Milton had not objected to continuing last year because the county was selling the debentures for the three additions. "We feel a little hurt that Georgetown waited until their debentures were sold and then moved for dissolution before Milton debentures were sold."

**Not Fair to Milton**  
The Milton trustee said he was unable to share the chairman's feeling of "fall for one and one for all." Milton never got a fair shake. There was equipment in the other schools that was only last year obtained for the Milton school. He also noted difficulty in establishing a salary schedule adequate to attract teachers to remain in Milton.

Acton's Mayor W. Cook noted he had listened to discussion hoping he would be made more aware of the problem and was instead utterly confused. "I have been confused since the member from the Department sat up there and explained the situation... he changed his suggestion five times. I have been confused since I listened to the Board chairman speak of harmony, and the Georgetown and Milton members tell there wasn't harmony. Then I listened to the Milton representative tell how they started the discussion. If this is leadership from the Department and this is harmony I sit down confused."

**By-law Urgent**  
A resolution to re-convene the Consultative Committee for submission of recommendations was debated and finally withdrawn as Reeve Sargent argued the urgency of decision to have dissolution possible in January of 1960 which would require a county by-law by July 1.

Mr. Stewart pointed out the approval of the Minister of Education would also be necessary before dissolution could be assured. G. E. Johnson, resident inspector, noted it would be "out of the question for any status change unless a decision was made at the meeting tonight. Otherwise it would be another year at least."

Discussion continued on whether a by-law should or shouldn't be prepared, the necessity of the Minister's approval, the requirement of expressed opinions from the participating municipalities and disapproval with "rushing it". Further discussion is likely when municipalities express their opinions and the by-law is submitted to county council.
