**County Inspectorate Loses Burlington**

BURLINGTON — The Burlington Board of Education announced last week the appointment of J. W. Singleton, B.A., B.Ed., principal of Northview Heights Collegiate, North York, as director of education, and the appointment of D. S. Lawless, B.A. M.Ed., inspector of public schools for the County of Norfolk, as superintendent of public schools.

Mr. Singleton and Mr. Lawless will assume their duties in August. The appointments were the inevitable result of the rapid growth in student enrolment and the need for professional direction of a system consisting of 20 schools of 350 teachers, and a student body in September next of over 10,000 pupils, the announcement said. The aim is to provide for better control of the system with all inspection at public school level divorced from the county inspectorate.

**Authority Offers \$40,000 To Buy Belfountain Park**

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority voted last Thursday night, April 30, to purchase Belfountain Park, one of the best known landmarks in the Caledon Hills. If approval to purchase is granted by Hon. Wm. Nickle, Ontario Minister of Planning and Development, the park will become public property this spring. The vendor, William Rogers of Belfountain, has agreed to accept the Authority's offer of \$40,000.00. The famous 22-acre forested retreat, nestles in a valley atop the mountain which towers over Forks of Credit. The crystal-clear west branch of the credit flows through the property, feeding an attractive miniature lake created by a dam which spans the gorge.

**Big Attraction**

Established shortly after the turn of the century by the late C. W. Mack, Toronto manufacturer, Belfountain has attracted many thousands of visitors from all over the world. It has been particularly popular with picnickers and sightseers from adjacent communities, particularly in Peel, Dufferin, Halton, Wellington and York counties.

The late Mr. Mack built the lodge, cottages, stone dam, grotto cave beneath the falls, suspension bridge, nature trails and other points of interest. Wanting to share the natural beauty spot, he opened the park to the public and hundreds flocked there each weekend. He made his visitors feel at home, asking only that they respect and take care of his trees and well-kept lawns.

After Mr. Mack's death, during World War II, the property was purchased by Carl G. Uteck, and became a commercial venture. The lake was opened to public swimming and refreshment booths were introduced. Rogers bought the park eight years ago.

With the property again up for sale, conservationists became concerned lest it be lost entirely to public use.

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
