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Rowdyism at Dances in Town Hall Is Discussed by Rockwood Parents

The annual meeting of the Rockwood Home and School Association was held on Tuesday evening, May 12, with a fair attendance. Only one item of business was deemed important enough to be dealt with this having been the last meeting until fall.

The retiring president, Mrs. T. Gallaty, read a letter received from a committee in the Janet Little Auxiliary of the Rockwood United Church.

It read: "Owing to many complaints of misbehavior during and after the weekly dances held in the town hall, a committee was formed in the Janet Little Auxiliary to contact the various organizations in the churches and village and ask that they discuss the problem at their meetings to try and arrive at some solution."

Range of Complaints
"The complaints cover drunkenness of school-age young people, obscene language in public and general rowdyism."

"The feeling is that this may be due to the dance being sponsored by outsiders. It attracts a rough element from other areas who behave away from home as they would not behave at home. This encourages our young people to behave in like manner."

"There is no wish to curtail wholesome fun but we cannot help but believe that frequent association with lower standards does dull discrimination until lower standards become acceptable."

"One suggestion is that letters be sent from organizations to the village trustees requesting that sponsorship of dances by outside interests be discontinued. There may be other methods that would bring better results."

"We trust that this will meet with your interest and that through discussion you may help to arrive at a solution."

Better supervision will be planned and a delegation of Home and School executives will attend the next meeting of the village trustees to try to find the means of stopping the rowdyism.
