Vacancy Filled by J. Hargrave Hire J. T. Hurst as Bookkeeper

Mr. Rachlin informed council, "For all the work entailed at the moment, there is no question in my mind we can get a person for \$2,500 but with what is in view, in my mind this person is qualified. I feel it is only fair to the town to start him at the minimum and increase as you suggest. I feel we are paying more than ample at present."

When the mayor called the vote on the amendment to the motion to engage Mr. Hurst at a starting salary of \$3,200, councillors H. Lowe, B. D. Rachlin and E. Pope voted in favor and Reeve J. H. Goy, Deputy Reeve J. M. Greer and W. J. McLeod opposed the motion. Mayor W. H. Cook broke the tie and the motion was lost.

The resolution to engage Mr. Hurst at a salary of \$3,500 per year was approved with councillors H. Lowe and E. Pope voting in the negative.

Elect New Councillor
J. Hargrave, former reeve and councillor, was elected by council to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. T. Hurst.

A lengthy discussion followed submission of the names of Mr. Hargrave, D. Hudson and C. Bishop for this council position.

Mr. Lowe suggested that balloting on these men be held and the mayor suggested that if the balance of council felt the same way, the appointment could be made in a committee of the entire council.

At this point, a verbal motion to adjourn was forwarded by councillor Rachlin, seconded by councillor Lowe. An amendment to the motion was moved and seconded by Reeve Greer and seconded by Reeve Goy, to adjourn following the question under discussion. The amendment to the motion was carried with councillors Lowe, Rachlin and Pope in opposition.

A motion to appoint J. Hargrave, sponsored by councillor McLeod and Reeve Goy, was followed by an amendment sponsored by councillors Lowe and Rachlin, to appoint D. Hudson. This in turn was followed by an amendment to the amendment to the motion sponsored by councillors Lowe and Pope, to appoint C. Bishop.

According to the procedural by-law, the last amendment is voted on first and when the question was called, it was defeated with Rachlin, Lowe and Pope voting in the affirmative. The first amendment was defeated also with Lowe, Rachlin and Pope voting in the affirmative. The original motion, which was carried, was opposed by Lowe, Rachlin and Pope.

Approve Charges
Following the recommendation of the building committee, council approved the following charges: \$500 rental per evening and \$100.00 for a full day for use of the council chambers; \$100.00 rental for the use of the arena per night; \$70.00 rental for the upper floor of the town hall for local organizations and \$35.00 for all others per day.

A resolution to change the ambulance rates in Acton was approved with Reeve Goy and deputy Reeve Greer in opposition.

The following is the revised rate schedule: from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., town residents will be charged \$5.00 per hour for the use of the ambulance and driver; non-residents will pay a \$6 flat rate plus an additional \$5.00 for the use of the ambulance and driver. From 7 p.m. to 7 a.m., Acton residents will pay \$7.00 per hour and non-residents a \$6 flat rate, plus \$7.00 per hour for the ambulance use.

It was further stipulated in all cases where an assistant to the driver is necessary, an additional \$4 per hour would be charged. The new rate schedule classified the Flynn Nursing Home as being in the town limits for town residents only and in cases of non-residents.

Other Business
Other items included on the agenda at Tuesday's meeting included:
• Approval of a by-law to borrow \$100,000 to meet any future expenses until such time as the taxes are collected.
• Approval of a by-law to apply to the O.M.I.C. for their purchase of school debentures amounting to \$170,000.
• Approval of an amendment to the official plan of the town to transfer property owned by Mrs. P. Murray from residential to commercial.
• Council learned from the administration committee they had accepted the resignation of G. Clifford from the town after 20 years' service.
