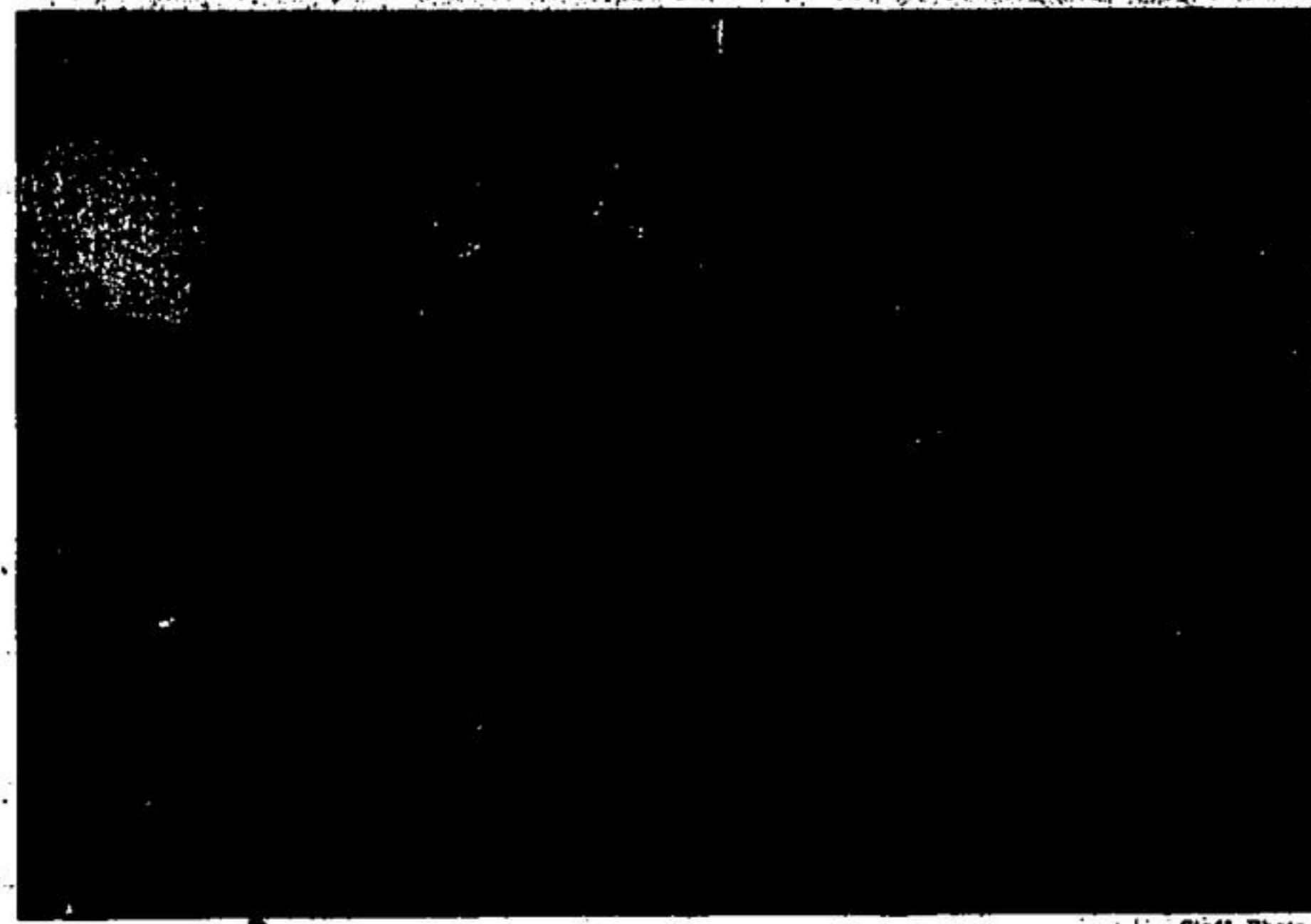
Plan Bazaar, Church Cleaning At Monthly Meeting of W.A.

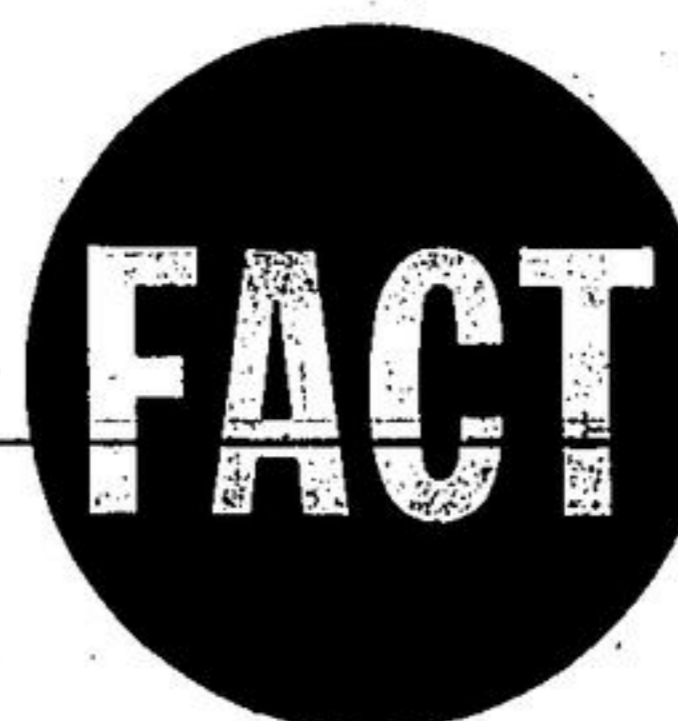
